

DEMPSEY HAS CHANCE TO MAKE A SHOWING BEFORE PHILA. FANS

Sensational Heavyweight Fighter and Title Aspirant Will Make Debut in This City Against Battling Levinsky at Olympia Tonight

By ROBERT W. MAXWELL Sports Editor Evening Public Ledger JACK DEMPSEY will attempt to prove before a Philadelphia audience tonight that he is the greatest heavyweight in the world and the logical person to fill the championship shoes left vacant by one J. Willard.

A year ago Dempsey virtually was an unknown. A few straggling reports of his prowess trickled in from the coast, but none was taken seriously. So many heavyweight phenomena had been thrust upon an unsuspecting public that the dope was discounted.

Dempsey started out like Terry McGovern and rushed Fulton to the ropes. He landed a left and right to the body and Fulton attempted to clinch. Jack stepped away and shot another right to the midriff and Fredward backed away.

AFTER that Dempsey, through his manager, Jack Kearns, tried to get Willard into the ring to battle for the championship. Big Jess, however, refused and said he would not fight until the year was over.

Levinsky Suitable Man to Oppose Dempsey

WHEN Willard refused a \$25,000 offer from Jimmy Dougherty to box Dempsey, the Baron of Leipersville looked around for a suitable opponent. Dougherty wanted to show Dempsey in Philadelphia, but did not care to put him against a "set up."

Before the Fulton-Dempsey match Dan Morgan, Levinsky's manager, paid us a visit and delivered the following oration: "I'd like to have Levinsky meet the winner of the big show, but I hope it won't be Fulton."

This was before the present match was thought of, but it goes to show that Morgan has a few ideas regarding the outcome of the bout tonight.

Jack Britton also picks Levinsky, but it must be remembered that the former welter champion is his stable mate and works with him daily.

AT ANY rate, it looks like a real scrap and the spectators will get their money's worth. A boxer and a fighter always put up a white-hot battle, and that's the dope on tonight's fracas.

"I HAVE been in the boxing game a long time," said Sunny Jim Coffroth the other night, "and have seen all of the leading boxers with the exception of Battling Levinsky."

There are others like Coffroth. Levinsky never has weighed more than 175 pounds, yet has taken on men like Tom McMahon, Al Kubicki, Jack Dillon, Rocky Flynn, Charley Weiner, Jim Coffey, Tony Ross, Bartley Madden, Guncho Smith, Jim Flynn, Tom Cowler, Bill Brennan and Carl Morris without serious injury.

Dempsey, however, is quite clever and may do some of that speedy stuff himself. Jack Kearns says his man will box Levinsky a couple of rounds and then fight until the latter takes the count.

LEVINSKY is a Philadelphia boy and started here in 1916 under the name of Barney Williams. Nick Hayes says he discovered him and shipped him to Morgan in New York.

There is another Philadelphia boxer who will get his first chance to step into the limelight against a top-notch fighter. He is Gussie Lewis, one of the best youngsters seen here in years.

"I want you to watch Lewis closely tonight," said Burns today, "because I feel sure he will give Dundee the fight of his life. For a long time we have been looking for a chance to show what Gussie really could do and we will take advantage of this opportunity."

Gussie has been boxing around Philadelphia for three years and was developed carefully by his father. He started as a flyweight, then a bantam, a featherweight and now considers himself a lightweight.

Hank McGovern, of Port Richmond, will face a tough foe in Joe Burman, of Chicago. Burman is working at Hog Island every day and does his training when he gets a furlough.

McGovern, however, is no slouch and will give Burman lots of trouble. Hank has met all of the best bantams and always made good.
