Baird Carries County by 10,000, Despite Presidential Opposition

Complete returns from Camden show that 9218 votes were cast in favor of "wet" city, and 4611 for "no saloons." Collingswood and Haddonfield, Camden County, voted "dry." Pensauken stays wets by ten votes, the final count being 422 for liquor and 412 against it.

Governor Edge's vote in Camden County was 16.684, compared to 6193 for his opponent. Senator Baird poled 16,631 compared to 6130 for his opponent, Charles O'Connor Hennessey. The in Camden County.
