#### **DELAWARE GOES** TO REPUBLICANS

Senator Willard Saulsbury Probably Defeated for Re-election

POLK IS ALSO BEATEN

Wilmington, Del., Nov. 6. Delaware Republicans, in spite of internal dissensions, won a notable victory by the election of Dr. L. Heisler Ball, a Republican and former United States Senator, over Willard Saulsbury, president pro tem, of the Senate and personal friend of President Wilson, by a mafority of from \$00 to 1000. The Republicans also elected Dr. Caleb R. Layton Republican, as Delaware's sole repre-sentative in Congress over Albert F. Polk, the incumbent. They also elected George M. Fisher State Treasurer and Daniel Thompson State Auditor.

While returns from the Legislature will not be completed until today, the Republicans have elected a majority of members of that body. The result was Warren County—Thomas A. Shields, Democrat.

The Republicans still control the next State Legislature. As a result of a majority on a joint bailot they will elect a State Treasurer to succeed William T. Reed, of Camden, whose term will expire on March 1.
