EXTRA PRESIDENT RECEIVES NEWS THAT TRUCE IS SIGNED. WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—President Wilson was informed of the signing of the armistice today by the United Press. The United Press dispatch from Paris brought the first news to Washington and it was conveyed to the State, War and Navy Departments and to both houses of Congress, as well as to the various embassies and legations by the Washington United Press bureau.

S.)—A total of 85,000 out of 95,000 ballots cast indicates that Senator Nugent of Idaho, Democrat, is leading Governor Shofar, Republican, for his seat. At the latest estimates Nugent had a lead of more than 500 votes in the race and probably will win.
