

WOMEN WILL TRY AGAIN

Retain Control of Senate and Have Majority on Joint

Trenten, N. J., Nov. 7-The Repub licans lost control of the New Jersey Assembly in Tuesday's election. The Democrats elected thirty members, a gain for them of sixteen. Republicans retained control of the Senate, however, and on a joint ballot will have a ma-

jority of nine. Prohibition wil be the chief issue fore the Legislature at the coming ses-sion. All the Republicans elected to the Assembly are pledged to support the national prohibition amendment. while the Domocrats were elected on a "wet platform."

Edge's plurality for the United States Senate is about 23,000, while that of Mr. Baird is not more than 15,000. In the Congress fights Republicans lost the Third. Eighth. Ninth. Eleventh and Twelfth Districts, two of which, the

Eighth and Ninth, are now represented by Republicans. The result in Essex spells defeat for prohibition for another year, at least, Even though the Republicans have the House, there is virtually not a chance of ratifying the prohibition amendment to the Forest Commission and Prothe Federal Constitution next year. Republican Assemblymen elected from some of the larger countles, notably Passate, are opposed to prohibition and probably will have the united support of all the Democrats. This seems to forecast sure defeat for the prohibition amendment. Results of the election are so confus-ing as to make it difficult to assign any single cause for the Republican slump. In the congressional contests it seems probable that the appeal of President Wilson, coupled with the momentous happenings of the last few days in the world war, have contributed to help the Democratic candidates. Local condi-tions were also against the Republicans in the Eighth and Ninth Districts, but uld not explain the small majorities of Republicans elsewhere.

SMITH WINS BY ABOUT 10,000
