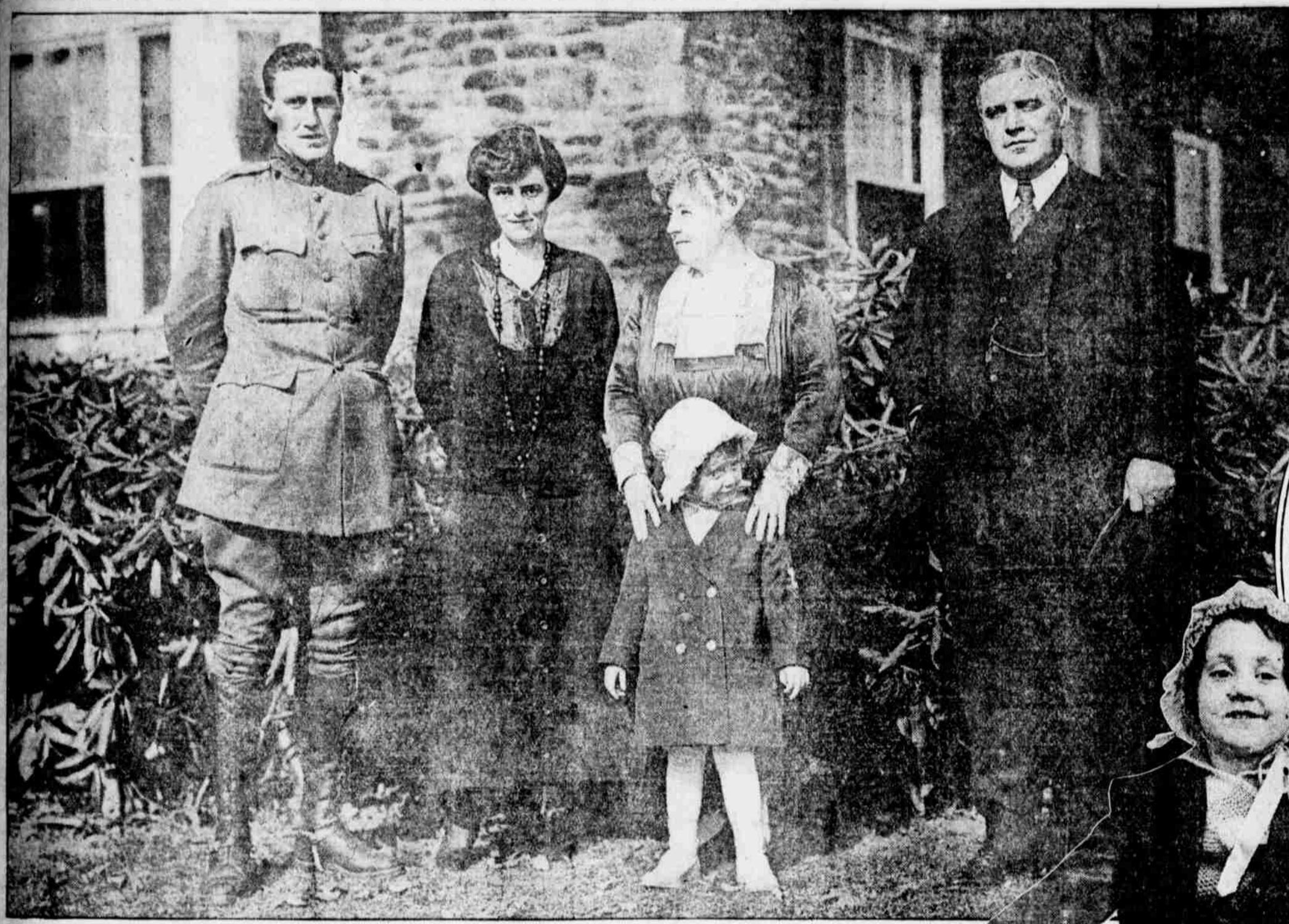

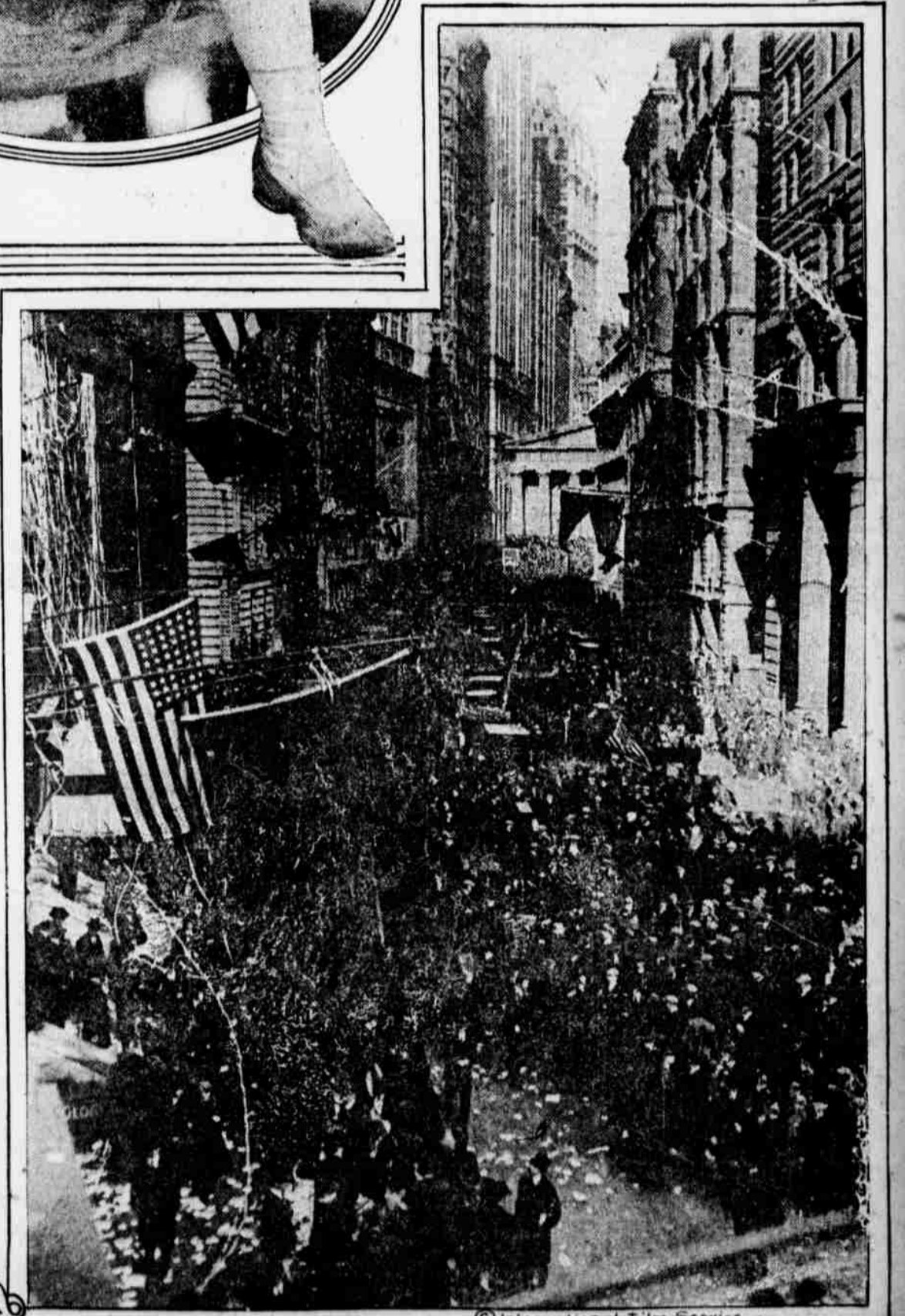
"YANKS" IN HISTORIC SEDAN
