Cape May Patrol Crew Hears Saetia Survivors Sound

PHILADELPHIANS ASSIST

Men Plunge Into Surf and Rescue Hungry and Exhausted Sailors

Fifteen survivors of the United States steamer Suetia, which was sunk off the New Jersey coast November 9, were rescued early today by patrol crews from the naval base at Cape May.

Despite the fact that they had been in the water for nearly forty-eight hours and their provisions were limited to a tin of biscuits and water, the morale of the survivors was strong.

The entire stricken will be sent to Philadelphia tonight.

Many of the rescuers who started the boats were Philadelphia boys, and they were equipped to change into dry clothes to reach the survivors.

Those rescued include: Harry Fortney, 21, of Philadelphia; George J. Jones, 22, of Philadelphia; and others.

It is generally believed that the ship was sunk by a mine, but this cannot be verified as officers of the naval base at Cape May decline to discuss the matter.

GOD'S JUSTICE, SAYS CONWELL

Baptist Temple Pastor Says Creator's Way is Inscrutable

"God's way is inscrutable, but as always it has proved to be the just way in this war."

With this statement the Rev. Dr. Russell H. Conwell, pastor of the Baptist Temple, proceeded to denounce the military and political situation in which the hand of Divine Providence had intervened to turn winning victories for Germany into crushing and costly defeats.

"With floods and storms and other agencies at His supreme command," said Dr. Conwell, "God has demonstrated His justice in His world, and His way is perhaps more clearly than ever before that ultimately Divine will always triumph over man's will."

When the Germans were making their second big push for Paris, it was a flood of the Marne which marked the beginning of their defeat. Storms have more than once aided the Allied armies, not only upon the land, but in the air, and time after time the winds have roiled back the German women cars, a curse to those who had sent it toward the Allied lines.
