

CASUALTY ROLL HAS 516 NAMES

Of the Day's Total 304 Are in List of Heroic Dead

WOUNDED NUMBER 196

Missing in Action, Including Prisoners, Add 16 to the Aggregate

Three hundred and four deaths are recorded today in General Pershing's casualty list. Of this number eighty men were killed in action, sixty-six died of wounds, fourteen of disease and seventeen of accidental and other causes. The day's total of casualties of all kinds is 516.

Commissioned officers, the highest ranking as captain, and a Philadelphia figure in the honor roll, which, as usual, contains a large proportion of soldiers from Pennsylvania and adjoining States. Summarized, the losses to date are:

FAREWELL, "VICTORY BREAD"

Real Flour Product Soon Will Displace War Variety By the Associated Press

Washington, Nov. 12.—"Victory" bread soon will disappear from the American table. Its place will be taken by bread made from whole wheat flour. Victory for American and Allied arms, however, is responsible only in part for the change. It is chiefly due, according to the food administration, to the tremendous wheat crop raised by the American farmer this year, the vast acres in Australia and other wheat-growing countries now made available and to a serious wheat shortage in dairy feeds.

It was said today at the food administration that no new wheat regulations have been issued, but they may be expected as soon as the mechanical details of the change can be worked out.



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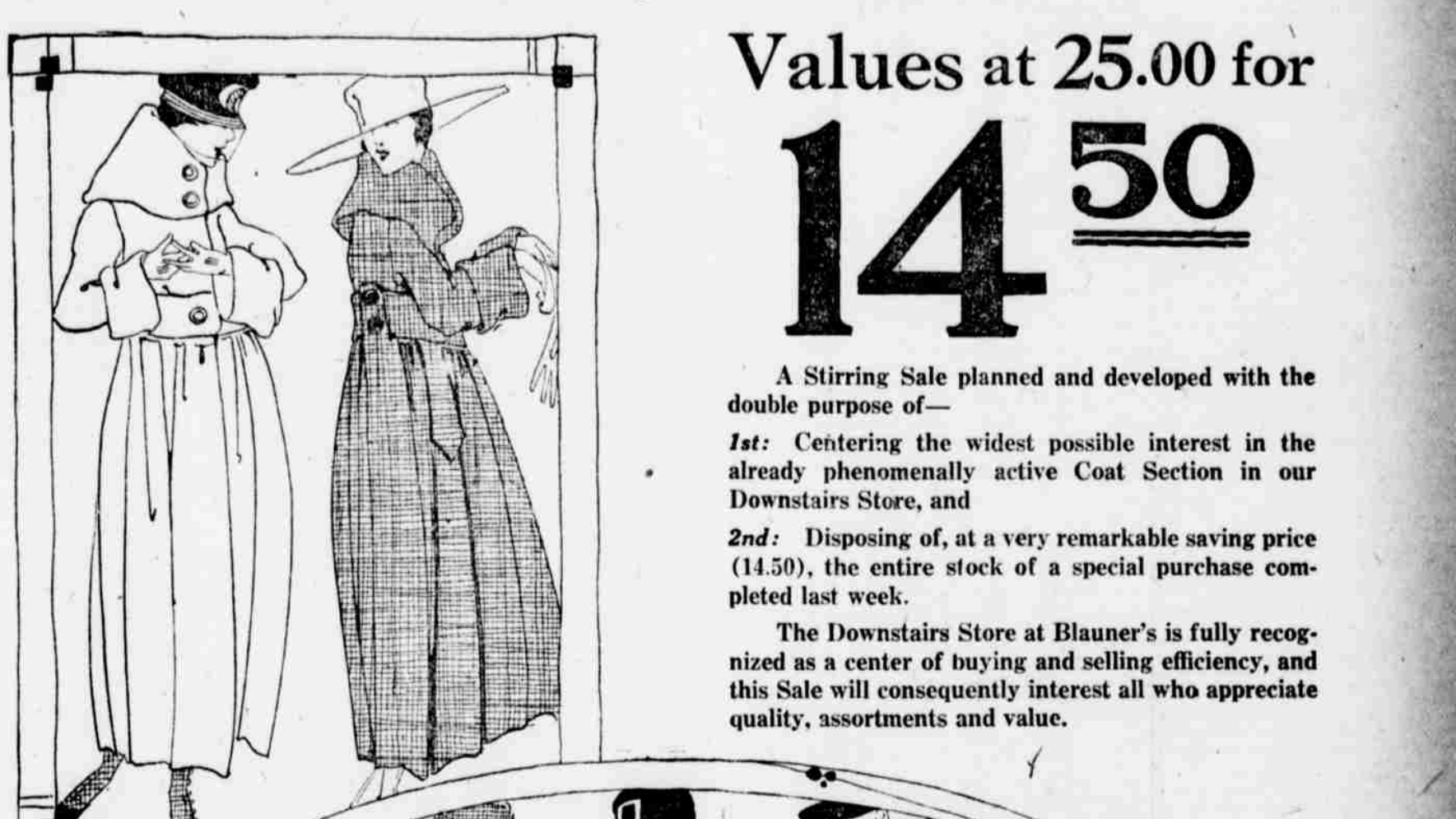
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
