

PRICE ADJUSTMENTS HINDER CORN TRADERS

Operators at Sea as to Proper Price Levels on Peace Basis

The corn market turned early this morning on a less bullish view of the export outlook, following a steady start. Traders again were very much at sea as to proper price levels on a peace basis and trading remained light.

Bearers argued that Europe would not buy great quantities of corn here with large supplies of wheat, rye and barley available.

November opened unchanged at \$1.23 and later sold at \$1.22½. December started at \$1.19½ and \$1.19½, against \$1.19½ at the close yesterday and later sold at \$1.18½. January was unchanged; \$1.20½ at the outset and later receded.

The arrivals here today were 124 cars. Shipments from Argentina for the week were estimated at 290,000 bushels, against 355,000 bushels last year.

Gains suggest under profit-taking after opening steady on reports of further sales for export. November started \$1.20½ at the open and \$1.21½ at the close. December was quoted at 71½c to 7½c at the outset, against 71½c at the end yesterday. January started at 70½c to 70½c, against 70½c at the end yesterday and later sold at 70½c.

The arrivals here today were 98 cars. No shipments were expected from Argentina for the week.

Shipments for the week total exports of wheat in Australia at approximately 170,000,000 bushels. Beneficial rains have been reported in many sections of that country. The weather in Argentina remains fine and all crops are excellent. Exports of wheat from Argentina for the week are estimated at 481,000 bushels, against 326,000 bushels last year.

The receipts of wheat at Minneapolis today were 219 cars, against 284 cars last year; at Duluth 154 cars, against 58 cars; at Chicago 76 cars, against 63 cars; and at Winnipeg 473 cars, against 1002 cars last year.
