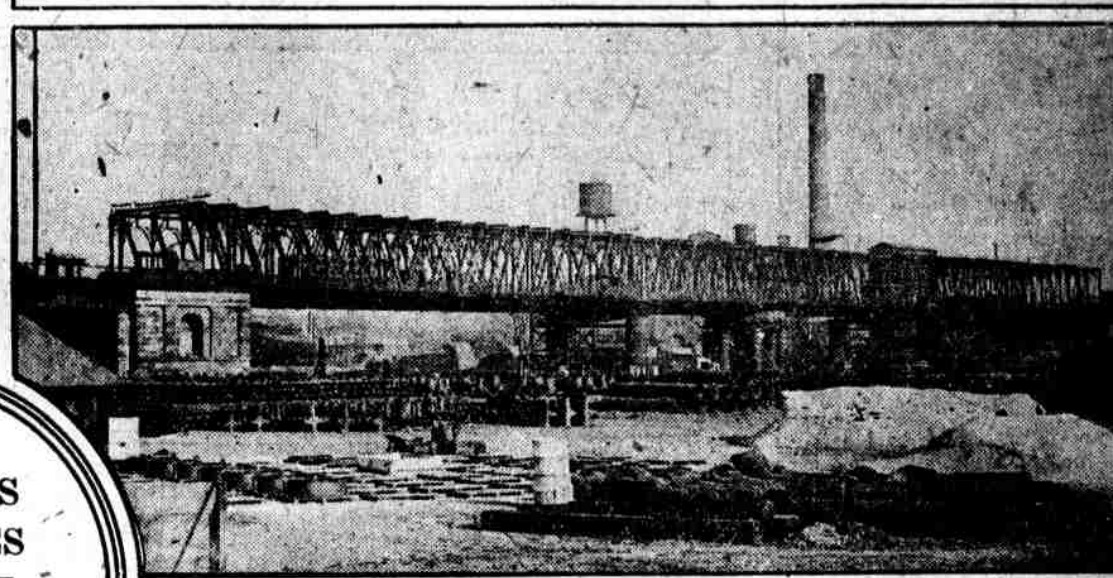
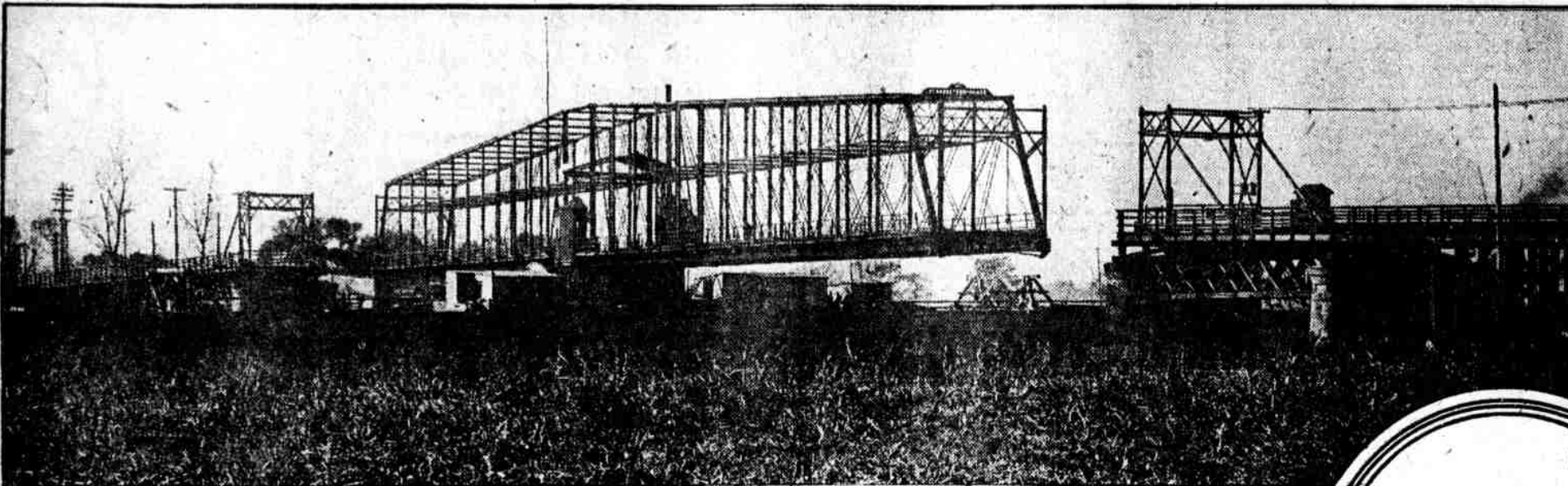


MANY MUNICIPAL PROJECTS SUSPENDED DURING WAR ARE NOW DEMANDING ATTENTION



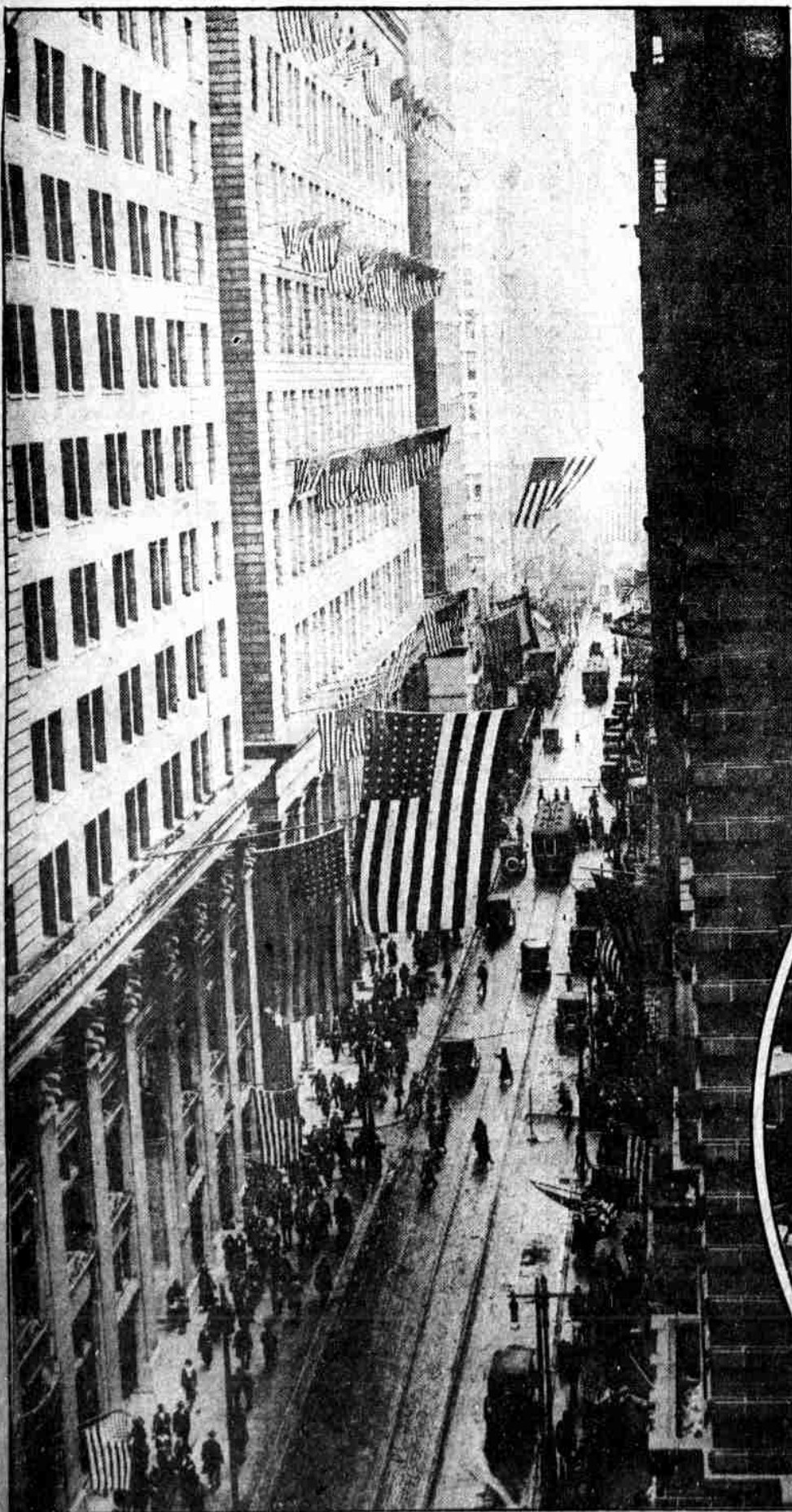
