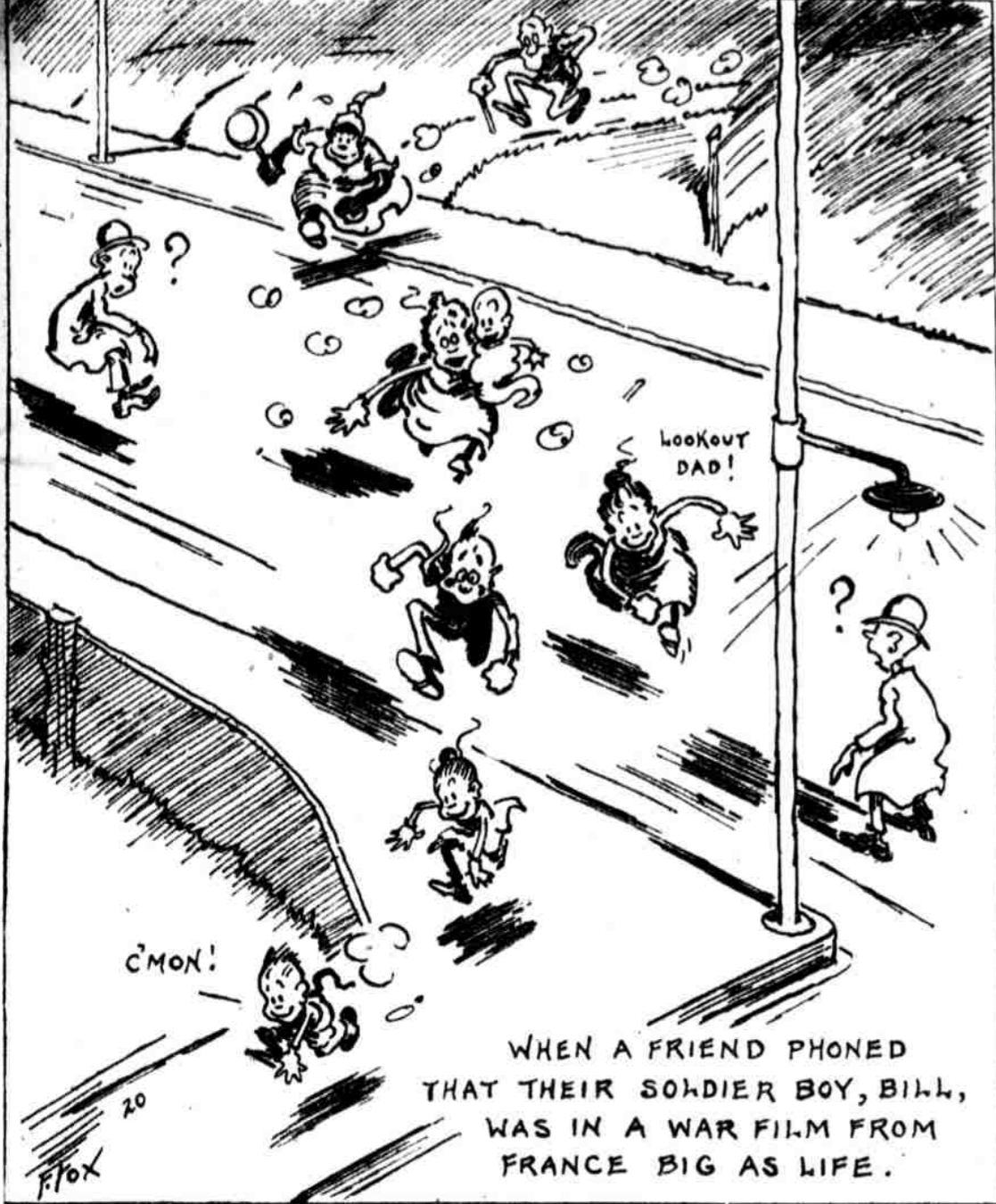

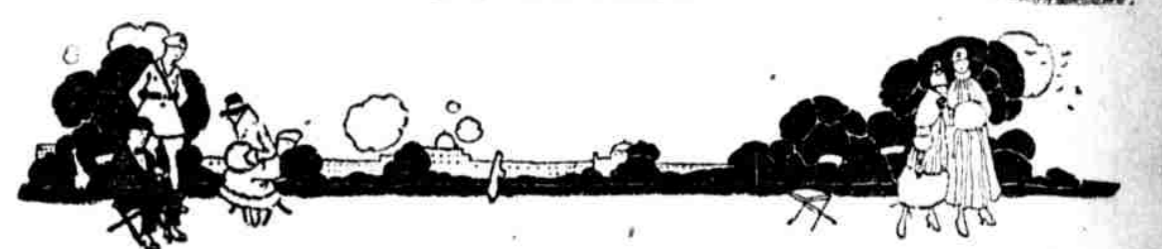

The Young Lady Across the Way

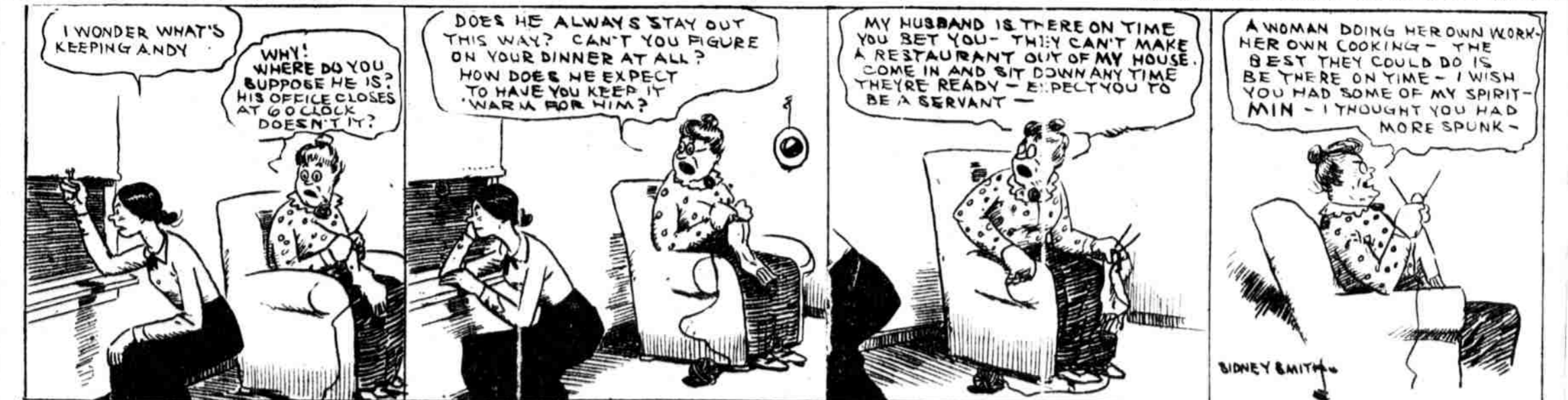


The young lady across the way says the fuel shortage is so serious in Germany that even if they had the raw materials she doesn't suppose they'd have anything to cook with.
