

### PENROSE STICKS TO CANDIDACY

#### Senator Says He Won't Withdraw From Finance Chairmanship Fight

SEES G. O. P. HARMONY

#### Signers of Alleged Letter From "Progressives" to Hays Still in Background

Washington, Nov. 20.  
Senator Penrose does not intend to withdraw as a candidate for chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and believes there will be perfect harmony among the Senate Republicans, and that his withdrawal will be unnecessary, and he does not belong to the "withdrawers anyway," he emphatically declared today.

"I confidently believe I shall succeed to the chairmanship of the Finance Committee, to which I am entitled by all the rules of seniority, and all is going to be harmonious in the Republican ranks for the organization of the Senate," said Senator Penrose. "All this talk about a progressive movement among the Senate Republicans to discard the rule of seniority is Democratic propaganda to encourage a break in our ranks that would allow the Democrats to continue control of the Senate."

This was Senator Penrose's comment on the report that a group of the Senate Republicans from the Middle West, headed by Senator William Borah, of Nevada, had written to Will Hays, chairman of the Republican National Committee, urging him to have Senator Penrose withdrawn as a candidate for the Finance Committee chairmanship, and threatening to force his withdrawal if he did not voluntarily step down.

Senator Penrose added that all of the Republican Senators who have discussed organization with him have assured him of their support for chairman of the Finance Committee.

Aide from all this is the gossip that eight Senators—Boah, Kenyon, La Follette, Gronna, Norris, Cummins, Poinsett and Lenroot—have agreed to band together to force Senator Penrose to step aside and make way for what they term a "progressive" organization of their number, for the chairmanship. If he does not abdicate, so the story goes, they will make it impossible for the Republicans to take control of the Senate away from the Democrats.

The Republicans in the Senate are going to defeat all efforts of Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo to write supplementary war revenue bill for 1920 into the revenue bill now under consideration.

"Secretary McAdoo is sadly mistaken if he believes the Republicans are going to sit idly by and permit him to write a \$4,000,000,000 war revenue bill for 1920 into the \$6,000,000,000 revenue bill for the present fiscal year now being considered by the Senate," said Senator Penrose.

"The Republican party is going to have something to say about taxation for the year 1920, when we shall have control of the Senate and House," he continued. "It would be fine for the Democratic Administration to have no doubt, to pass in the December session a war revenue bill covering the period right up to the next election, but it won't happen."

#### DISTRICT NEAR LEADER IN LOAN

Only Boston and Richmond Returned Bigger Oversubscriptions

Only two Federal reserve districts—Boston and Richmond—exceeded Philadelphia in oversubscription of the fourth Liberty Loan.

Total subscriptions to the loan were \$1,898,047,000, the Treasury Department announced after final tabulations had been completed. The oversubscription of \$389,047,000 was 16.48 per cent. Every Federal Reserve district exceeded its allotted quota.

This makes the fourth Liberty Loan by far the greatest war loan ever floated by this or any other Government.

Bonds of the fifth war loan, to be offered probably in the spring, will be of short maturity, Secretary McAdoo announced. This was interpreted as meaning five years or less. Previous loans range between ten and thirty years.

#### MANY DRAFT APPEALS HERE

Third of All Pleas in State Came From City

More than one-third of all appeals from rulings of local draft boards in this State came from Philadelphia. Nearly two-thirds of the Philadelphia appeals were rejected.

Major W. C. Mardock, chief draft officer for the State, disclosed these facts today at Harrisburg.

Philadelphia district boards voted upon 13,447 claims for exemption, 11,953 of them having been industrial and eighty-nine agricultural. Appeals to the district board numbered 1495, and 926 of these were refused. The total number of appeals in the State was 3509. Of these, 2295 were turned down.

The eight district boards of the State decided 103,051 claims for deferred classification, rejecting 36,409 of them. Industrial claims were made by 81,626, the boards refusing 29,673 of them, and of 17,919 agricultural claims, 4041 were denied.

#### DEUTSCH AIDE ADVANCED

Bogdanoff, Out of One Job, Gets Better One

Michael Bogdanoff, who was secretary of the Deutscher Fifth Ward Club during the stirring primary fight last year, has been appointed an inspector in the Bureau of Weights and Measures at a salary of \$1500 a year.

He succeeds Andrew Rosenbaum, another Deutscher aide, who was dropped from the payroll the night of December 7. Bogdanoff formerly was a writ server in the Sheriff's office, at \$1000.

During the Fifth Ward trial at West Chester Bogdanoff took an important part in handling the witnesses for Deutscher and the other defendants. He was a witness himself and swore the Frog Hollow gunmen never quartered in the Deutscher club.

Philadelphian Belgian Committee Hopes to Make Total Reach \$20,000

Philadelphia's gift to King Albert of Belgium on the occasion of his birthday anniversary, which occurred last Monday, was a relief fund of \$14,500. With additional contributions arriving at the Belgian relief headquarters, the committee is hopeful of the fund reaching \$20,000.

Mrs. Bayard Henry, chairman of the Belgian relief committee, announced this morning that a draft for 100,000 francs, amounting to \$18,500, would be made out and sent immediately through the Belgian minister at Washington to King Albert. An extra appeal is being sent out this year by the committee for funds to insure a happy Christmas for Belgian children, their first in four years. A check for \$50, to form the nucleus of this fund, was received today by Mrs. Henry.
