PITT-GEORGIA TECH TEAMS UNDEFEATED SINCE 1914 SEASON

First Time in History Two High - Class Intersectional Elevens Will Meet to Settle Gridiron Title-Harry Fighe, Old Yale Star, Boosts Heisman's Methods

IN the University of Pittsburgh and Georgia Tech meet in Pitts-W gh on Saturday it will be the first time two evenly matched elevens we met in an intersectional battle. Attempts have been made in the get together representative teams from the East and West, and although several of these games have been staged, none really could be called a championship contest. The champions never got together as with be the case with Pitt and Tech.

The University of Chicago used to play Penn twenty years ago, Wis consin once traveled eastward to meet Yale and Michigan battled Harvard and Penn, but there never was much national interest in the affairs. On Saturday we will have the best team in the East stacked up against the VERY best aggregation in the South, and the winner will be bailed the champion of the universe. Warner and Heisman will settle the question of supremacy

In this section we know all about the prowess of the Piti team, but Tech's reputation has come through glowing reports from Atlanta. Last year Penn played the Golden Tornado and lost by the score of 41 to o and that game did more to put the Georgia institution on the map than anything else. It was the only chance we have had to compare Tech and an eastern team.

Georgia Tech has been very successful, but we do not know what kind of opposition the team has met outside of Penn. Tremendous accres have been run up, but it seems strange that some of the battles with Washington and Lee, the University of Georgia, Alabama Poly and the University of Alabama have been remarkably close. Those to 0 scores were made against elevens about as strong as our prep schools, but never against fairly well-coached teams

In 1915 Tech defeated Auburn 7 to 0 and played a 9-to-9 ue with Georgia University. The next year Davidson was defeated 9 to 0. North Carolina 10 to 6 and Washington and Lee held to a 7-to-7 tie. Last year, however, Tech ran roughshod over every one, amassing a total of 491 points against 17 for the opponents. . .

THIS year in five games Heisman's train has accord all points and the goal line has not yet been crossed. In four seasons 1555 points have been scored, against 61 for the opponents, which is a great record.

Pitt and Georgia Tech Unbeaten Since 1914


NEITHER Pitt nor Georgia Tech has lost a game since 1914. In that year Bob Folweil's Washington and Jefferson team trimmed Pitt by the score of 13 to 9. Tech met with two reverses, losing to the University of Alabama 13 to 0 and to Alabama Poly at Auburn 14 to 0. It is seldom that two elevens go through four seasons without a reverse, and this makes the coming battle more interesting.

Since Warner took charge of the Panthers in 1915 he finished second once and won two championships. His teams have met and defeated all of the good ones in this section and had only one narrow escape-in 1916. when the Navy was beaten by the margin of one point. Twenty-eight games have been played and twenty-eight have been won. There were no tie games. Pitt, however, did not try for record scores and piled up only \$33 against the opponents' \$2.

Thus we have the dope on the rival teams, and it will take a lucky muy to guess the outcome on Saturday. Tech is considered unbeatable down South and Pitt has the same social standing up here. In getting a on the strength of Tech and Pitt the only thing to do is to compare strength of their opponents. Heisman's team has defeated Wake Forst, Furman, Davidson, Tulane, Vanderbilt, Penn, Carlisle, Clemson, Transylvania, Cumberland, Louisiana State and others in that section, while Pitt has scored victories for the last four seasons over Penn and whington and Jefferson and for three seasons over Penn State, Annapolis, recuse, Lehigh, West Virginia and Carnegie Tech.




