John Lewis Evans, of Haverford, prominent lawyer and noted cricketer, refused to leave his command, but stuck to his post until again overcome.

This time his officers persuaded him to go to a field dressing station. On the way Major Evans and several wounded men who were with him ran finto a barrage fire. Two of his companions were killed. At the dressing station the major asked for the chaptain for one of his men, and his own brother. Lieutenant Allen Evans, Jr., responded.

Major Evans was in command of the 310th machine gun battalion, a unit of the Seventy-ninth division, trained at the Seventy-hinth division, trained at Camp Meade, and made up of selected men from Pennsylvania and Maryland. Three maajors of that division, all widely known in this city, were killed in action. They were Major Alfred Reginald Allen, Major Benjamin Franklin Pepper and Major Ward W. Pierson.

Major Evans was injured on November 4 just a week before the armistice.

The combined casualty lists for today give the largest total ever made public by the War Department in two consecu-tive days, All told, 6175 names are listed including 427 from Pennsylvania. The fotal for Philadelphia and district is 153, forty-six having been killed in action, eighteen having died of wounds and twelve of disease. Fifty-seven have been wounded and seventeen are re-ported missing.

Private William J. Moore, twenty-eight years old, reported killed in action, was one of the first men to be drafted-from this city, but although he went to Camp Meade in September, 1917, he was kept there as a mechanic until last July, when he sailed with Company D. 315th Infantry. His wife, Mrs. Carol Moore, received a letter from him dated September 22 in which he said that he was in an advanced dugout waiting for orders to go over the top. Four days later he evidently got the orders and attac 4 the enemy, for he is reported killed a me time between the 26th and 30th of September. He was a hardware saiesman and lived at 5533 Upland street. A brother, Robert, is with the marines in San Domingo.

Private Ernest C. Neurath, killed in action, was twenty-five years of age and resided with his mother at 3002 North Gsydenham street. The young soldier was member of the United States navy as a wireless operator, but was discharged ewing to an attack of ptomaine poisoning. He is reported to have been missing since October 13, but a letter to his mother, Mrs. Anna Weiss, under date of October 21, states that he was slightly wounded. Private Weiss was among the first men to be drafted and was at Camp Gordon and Camp Meade a long time before going over. Offered Portugal and Gibraltar for Spanish Aid, Says Stetson's Widow

Germany offered to give Portugal and Gibraltar to Spain if the latter would help defeat the Allies, according to Countess de Santa Eulalia, widow of John R. Stetson, who spoke last night in the Oak Lane Baptist Church, Twelfth street and Oak Lane avenue.

It was generally understood in Portugal, she said, that Germany was employing every means at her command to obtain the aid of Spain. It mattered very little to the Teutonic Government, she added, whether the liberty of a race and nation was at stake. Secing that Spain was uncertain in her decision, and Portugal averse to the proposal, she sowed her kultur propaganda, which split Portugal into two factionsone side assuming a hatred for England

and the other combating it.
"England was always friendly to Por-tugal and her deeds will never be for-gotten by the Portuguese," the Counters continued. "It is inconceivable Portugal would break her old Portugal would break her old treaty with Great Britain, who aided her against the common foe.
