General Pershing Sends * Report of Army and Marine Losses

122 KILLED IN ACTION

Many Officers Among Heroes Who Made Supreme Sacri-

fice for Country

Washington, Dec. 3. General Pershing's ensualty report for today comprises losses in the army and in the marine corps. The total is 890, of which forty-two were deaths of fight-ing men of the land forces and eighty "soldiers of the sea," the latter obvious-ly comprising the record of more than a single day. A feature of the report is the large number of officers who made the last sacrince for their country.
