cil of twenty one elected by the city at large, with the right only for the elec-torate to vote for fourteen members, which would give the right for seven men to be elected jointly, upon the theory of indepednent lines of representation or minority lines of representation, so there would always be seven men to be elected by the city-at-large, irrespective of the right of voting for the fourteen.

"I would make the term of Council-man co-terminus with the Mayor-at a mlary to be fixed. Certain broad gen-tral limitations should be placed on Councils by legislative enactment, it arder to protect the so-called seven men who are elected and who are supposed to endemont as it were say, the indeeptement, as it were, say, the inde-endent thought of the community. A wo-thirds vote would be required on all sills after the annual appropriation bill had been passed. I would not have this s rule of Councils, which would be sub-ject to the will of Councils, but by legis-lative enactment.

"The chairmen of the respective com tees, ranging in their importance, uid receive a salary beyond that of members of Councils.
