

CASUALTIES GIVE 474 MEN MISSING

Pershing Reports 1323 Americans in Losses Suffered by Army in France

158 KILLED IN ACTION Almost Half the Roll Composed of Men Who Suffered Wounds

Washington, Dec. 4.—The War Department today added 1623 names to the list of American army losses in France. There were 158 killed in action and 474 were reported missing.
