A. S. R.; and was a life member of Lu Lu Temple, A. A. O. N. M. S. Previous to entering military service he was a salesman in the commercial stationery business.

Names of nineteen Philadelphians kill-ed in action, four died of wounds and seven died of disease, making a total of twenty-eight dead, are contained in the casualties for today. 


