KILL NINE FRENCH CAPTIVES Fifteen Others Wounded, Spanish

Paris, Dec. 9. — Nine French prisoners were shot by the Germans and fitteen other prisoners were seriously wounded at the prison camp at Langensalza. Prussian Saxony, the Spanish ambassador at Berlin reports. The behavior of the prisoners did not in the least justify the severity of this act of repression, it was declared.

The French Government, it is indicated, is resolved to demand reparation for this act of the Germans, which will be added to the already long list of occurrences of this and similar of occurrences of this and similar nature.

It was reported in a Paris dispatch of December 5 that incidents of "se-rious gravity" had occurred within the 'ast few days in a prison camp in Saxony, where Allied soldiers were confined, and the Allied Governments

were said to have decided to act ener-getically in this connection. It was ap-parently this incident which gave rise to the report printed in the North German Gazette of Berlin that Allied occupation was to be extended even temporarily to Berlin, the reason given in this report being a "regrettable in-cident during which a supervisor of a prisoners' camp shot three French




