Philadelphians Lost Heavily but Won Crossing of River

Philadelphia jost a total of 451 offi-rs and men, killed, wounded and miss-g, during the now famous battle of Meuse, which lasted from Septem-ir 26 to September 30, inclusive. The under of men slightly wounded has not yet been determined.

fensive, but the results fully justified be expenditure, according to military ex-erts, the successful crossing of the feuse having much to do with the final billapse of the German defense. The State of Pennsylvania also was hard hit in that offensive, but accurate figures are not available as to the casualties from the Commonwealth as whole. The units participating in the battle, which were mainly composed of Fennsylvanians, were the 513th, 514th, 515th and 316th regiments of infantry, the 304th Engineers, 512th Machine Gun attailon, and 158th Headquarters

Private Edward Fitzgerald, reported as killed in action in an official telegram from the War Department received last Soldier "Killed"

July 17 was as wounded in a previous official telegram which Reported Wounded came on Monday last, the first on July 23 message said he had been killed on July 23. Mr. Fitzgerald refuses to credit the last report, for, he says, "if the lad was alive to be wounded on the 23d he could not have been killed on the 17th." He added that he believed there had been a case of mistaken identity by the Government agents who collected and arranged the casualty lists, as he understood there was another young man in his son's company of identically the same name. This young man is believed to have been killed in action.

Private Fitzgerald enlisted on July 11, 1917, was trained at Syracuse, N. Y., and went to France in October of last year as a member of Company C. Ninth Infantry, He is twenty-three years old and lived with his father at 1236 South Hancock street.

Cesperal Thomas M. Kerrane, 2000 North Eleventh street, was wounded in action. October 6. This information came in a War Department telegram to Michael McLaughlin, of the Eleventh street address. Previous letters had said that Kerrane was gassed. Corporal Kerrane enlisted May, 1917, in the Seventy-rights Field Artlibery and was in training at Forth Ethan Allen, Vt., until late May, when his unit, went overseas. He is twenty-two, His parents are dead, and he was employed by the Midvale Steel Company.

Private Timothy Reardon, wounded, was drafted in May of this year, volunteered for immediate service when he resched Camp Meade, was assigned to Company H, 315th Infantry, and went overseas in July. He was a weaver by trade and lived with his wilowed mother. Mrs. Helen Conrad, at 3427 Westmore-hand street.

Captain, Missing War Department the Red Cross and Since October 4 of his own brother. Lieutenant Edward C. Lukens, of the 220th Infantry, has not yet been located. Lieutenant Lukens has heard that his brother was in a French hospital, but so far has been unable to find out which hospital. Captain Lukens is the son of Lewis N. Lukens, of Haverford, and was acting commander of the Second Battalion of the 316th Infantry when he vanished in such mysterious fashion. Two of his men reported the day after he failed to appear for roll-call that they had seen the captain in a small clump of woods about noon of October 4. The officer was wounded, but not severely, and had told them to get back to their company, adding that he could look after himself all right. Later the Germans recaptured that clump of woods and held it for several hours, but were eventually driven out again. A careful search of the place revealed no trace of Captain Lukens.
