

POLAND WANTS TRIPLE ALLIANCE

Proposes Treaty With Bohemia and Jugo-Slavia to Unite With Entente

CONVENTION IS PLANNED

Nobles and Landholders Flee From Ukraine and Lithuania

By the Associated Press Washington, Dec. 18.—The Polish Government has proposed that a treaty be signed by Poland, Bohemia and Jugo-Slavia, says the National Zeitung of Basel, according to a dispatch received today.

Poland would include all Prussian territory inhabited by Poles who would number in the new country about 3,000,000 people, Hungary, according to the National Zeitung, which is considered pro-Austrian, desires to be included in the alliance and it is reported that the same tendency is being found in Vienna.

Copenhagen, Dec. 18.—(By A. P.)—The Polish Government has declared itself ready to conclude a military and political alliance with the Entente nations, according to the Cologne Gazette.

Dispatches from Vienna to the same newspaper report that the town council of Karlsruhe has asked President Wilson to recognize Karlsruhe as an independent republic, under American supremacy.

Warsaw, Dec. 18.—(By A. P.)—Every train arriving here is bringing the families of Polish nobles, land owners and sugar manufacturers, refugees from Ukraine and Lithuania, where bands of peasants are massacring and robbing. This is particularly true of Ukraine, from which place the Germans are slowly returning to their own country.

The correspondent talked with Count Potocki, who was obliged to flee from his estate adjoining that of the Countess Josef Gyzski, formerly Miss E. M. Patterson, of Chicago, in Volhynia. The Countess left at the beginning of the war. Count Potocki said:

"Last year the peasants burned and pillaged, but this year they are killing, since they want the land. They noted that during the German occupation the owners came back, so now they intend to do away with the owners and do not wish to destroy the property which they later expect to own."

"It is necessary for the Allies to enter the country to replace German troops who have kept some form of order. The Austrians, having sold their arms, left long ago. Fighting for the possession of Ukraine began weeks ago, the Skorodinski regime being opposed by Petourin, who is forty years old and a former music hall dancer. He was overthrown during German occupation of the country, but as the Germans withdrew he returned and re-established himself. He has formed a republic, but his domination of the peasant bands is loose. He advises the arrest of landlords and others, but does not approve of executions. He is not a Jew."
