Corporal Keer enlisted some time before this country declared war on Germany, figuring, as he told his mother, that it was inevitable the United States "take a hand in the world ganie," and declaring he wanted to "beat even the President to it." Washington, Dec. 20 .- General Pershing's report for the day includes both army and marine casualties. In the former thirty-two are recorded killed in action, while twenty-one "sea soldiera" fell while fighting. The deaths by wounds number forty-twenty-nine the army and eleven in the marine corps, while disease and accident claimed sixty-six victims, of whom fifty were of the army and sixteen of the marine corps.
