

ADJUTANT GENERAL, KILLED BY SHELL. Red Cross Man Dies Trying to Help City Soldier. TWO HURT THREE TIMES. One of Brothers Nearly Died From Drinking Water Poisoned by Foe.

Dropped by a German bullet that entered the right side of his neck and came out by his left shoulder, Corporal John M. Griffenburger had scarcely been helped to his feet by a Red Cross man when a piece of shrapnel crushed the skull of the stretcher bearer.

Private Charles F. Wasser, of Hellerstown, Pa., was wounded and gassed during the clearing of the Argonne forest, but is now convalescing in a French base hospital. He joined the colors last spring and went to France in August as a member of Company E, 115th Infantry.

Private Edward J. White, of Quakertown, Pa., wounded early in October, is recuperating in a Red Cross base hospital. He was drafted last January and went to France in July as a member of Company G, 115th Infantry.

Private George Wolf, 3923 N. Fifth st., died in action October 18. He is twenty-three, single, and was a member of Company D, 115th Infantry.

Private Leonard Joseph, twenty-three, son of 2823 North Tenth st., was reported missing on the official casualty list a few days ago. The War Department telegram reached his father on December 12 and was a great shock to the parent. Two days later the boy arrived from young Levin, which had been written on December 12 stating that he had become separated from his outfit, but was safe and sound with another unit.
