Wounded Number 540 and Grand Total of All Casualties Is 221,600

Washington, Jan. 6. Two hundred and seventy-eight deaths are recorded in General Pershing's casualty list today. Of these, fifty-eight reported "killed in action," while 120 succumbed to wounds and ninetyeight to disease. Fifty-three are miss-ing, the wounded number 540 and the grand total of all army casualties to date is 221,600.
