Fifty-eight Killed in Action, 130 Die of Wounds, 90 of Disease

53 REPORTED MISSING

Wounded Number 540 and Grand Total of All Casualties Is 221,600

Washington, Jan. 6.—Two hundred and seventy-eight deaths are recorded in General Pershing's casualty list today. Of these, fifty-eight are reported "killed in action," while 130 succumbed to wounds and ninety-eight to disease. Fifty-three are missing, the wounded number 540 and the grand total of all army casualties to date is 221,600.

SHIP NEWS BOSS HARLAN CHIPPER FORMERLY A PUGILIST

Elmer Cox Known in Ring as "Eddie Hanlon," Once Scrappy Bantamweight

From the fistie ring to boss chipper and caulker is the record of Elmer Cox, of the Harlan shipyard.

When Elmer, or "Eddie," settled down, leaving the white lights over his shoulders, and took a home in Wilmington, he entered the shipbuilding business with the same "zip" that characterized his efforts in the ring, and resolved to reach the top rung in ship construction.

Cox started in the boiler shop, followed his calling from yard to yard, from coast to coast, until he had accumulated all the feints, body blows, etc., that go to make up the experienced shipman.

Then came the war, and he re-commenced his efforts at the Harlan yard, putting on extra speed to help Uncle Sam build much-needed ships.

Cox is recognized as one of the most capable leaders on the Delaware River and is well liked by his men. One of his workers remarked:

"What Elmer doesn't know about chipping and caulking could be written on an undersized postage stamp, with a broken fountain pen, and there would be lots of plain surface remaining."
