Questioned as to the Allies as a whole to the League of Nations, Lord Robert said that every one favored a league of some sort and that they were not separated by any vital point. As to the scope of the league, he said there still were many purely legal disputes between nations which he thought ought to be settled by an architecture in thomal to be settled by an arbitration tribunal outside the league.




