Fall of Cabinet Due to Dispute Regarding Territorial Claims

SONNINO'S IDEA OPPOSED

U. S. Against His Policy on Fiume—D'Annunzio Demands Dalmatia

By the Associated Press Paris, Jan. 17.—News of the resignation of the Italian cabinet has been received here.

The present crisis is said to be due to the conflict in the Orlando ministry between those favoring and those opposing the policy of Foreign Minister Sonnino for the largest possible territorial annexation and for no concessions, particularly to the Jugoslavs.

The Italian peace delegates here express the belief that the resignation followed when it became known to Premier Orlando that the United States representatives are not in agreement with Baron Sonnino's views concerning Fiume.

Copyright, 1919, by the N. Y. Times Co. Milan, Jan. 17.—Fresh fuel for the fiery outburst of sentiment in Italy is furnished today in a passionate rhetorical manifesto from the warrior poet, Gabriele d'Annunzio, demanding the inclusion of all Dalmatia in the kingdom of Italy.

This extraordinary manifesto fills six columns of a special edition of the newspapers. D'Annunzio follows it up with a torrent of merciless invective against Signor Bissolati and that portion of the nation which indorses his renunciation policy by writing boldly:

"No bones, no scraps, no rags, no bargaining, no frauds! Enough! Enough! Overturn the counters! Smash the false balances! If it becomes necessary, we will confront the new conspiracy after the fashion of the Italian arditi, with a bomb in either hand and a knife between the teeth."

Contrary currents of public feeling on the question are coursing with such violence that the annexationist counter-demonstration, which was to have been held last night at La Scala opera house, with the intention of introducing several Dalmatian orators, had to be vetoed at the last moment by the police.

It is stated that Signor Bissolati, the socialist ex-minister, who during the last decade has been one of the most prominent figures in the Italian political arena, intends to deliver before his constituency in Rome the speech which mob violence prevented his making at Milan, in execution of his break with the Orlando-Sonnino coalition, and that the event will mark Bissolati's final retirement from political life.

Si crede che il Comm. Stringher assumerà il portafoglio del Tesoro, l'on. Facta quello di Grazia e Giustizia, l'on. Fraialetto quello delle Poste e Telegrafi, l'ammiraglio Thaon di Revel quello della Marina e il Generale Dall'olio quello della Guerra.

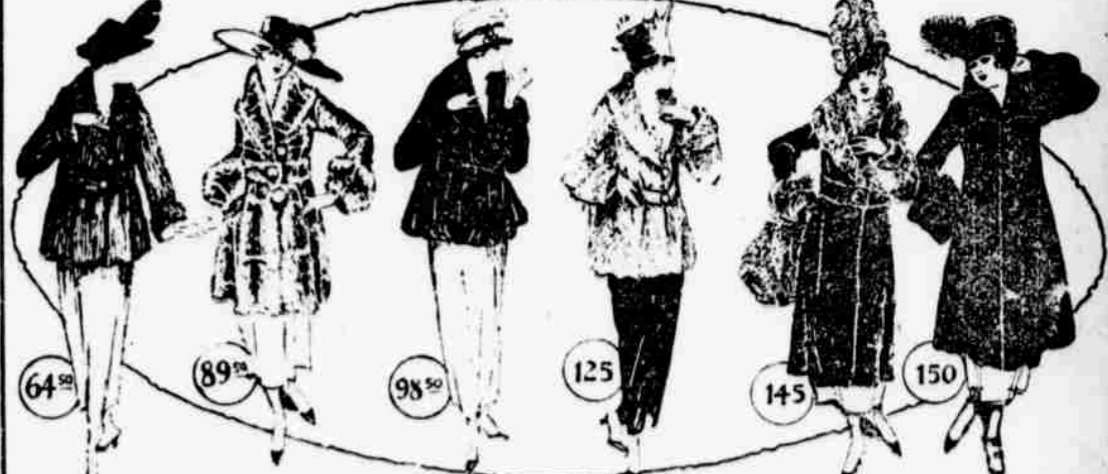
