GOSSIP OF THE STREET

PHILADELPHIA BANKERS APPROVE WORK TO PROTECT BONDHOLDERS

Campaign Meeting With Success-"Scalpers" Said to Buy Bonds, but Withhold Interest-Opinions on Next U. S. Loan-Gossip of the Street

THE vigorous campaign which is being waged by the New York Stock Exchange against Liberty Bond fakers is meeting unanimous approval among Philadelphia bankers and brokers. One of the latest and meanest practices in this connection is said to be conducted by certain concerns styling themselves as bankers, but whose proper title is 'scalpers." These parasites sometimes offer a higher price than the open market quotations call for, but withhold the accrued interest, and the seller is getting less than by following the custom of regular bond and investment houses.

The New York exchange, in order to meet this form of petty thievery, now issues each day the closing "bid" and "asked" quotations on all United States Government bonds as well as those of foreign countries. It is said that to these bonds will be added the accrued interest in the event of an actual transaction.

Contradictory Rumors on Foreign Bond Offering

There are contradictory rumors affoat in the financial district over the flotation of certain foreign loans in this country prior to the fifth Victory Loan campaign. Some financiers expressed their views on the matter through this column on Saturday, but it now appears that no such loans are anticipated. Nevertheless, dispatches from Washington report that Great Britain may enter the American market with a new issue of securities, approximately \$200,000,000. While the report stated that the Treasury had asked bankers to make such an offering, it was said to be denied by J. P. Morgan & Co., the British fiscal agents, that any such application is pending.

Discussion on the next Liberty or Victory issue of government bonds still keeps up in the financial district. An expert on bonds, when speaking of the suggestion by a certain banker for a long-term 5 per cent bond, said he did not think such a bond should be considered in this connection. For a long time, he remarked, many municipalities have held back much needed financing so as not to interfere with Liberty issues. They are still holding off mainly through a sense of patriotism, but as soon as the fifth victory issue of \$5,000,000,000 or \$6,000,000,000 is placed they will be ready to go on the market. Consider for a moment, he said, what they will be up against in competition-a 5 per cent long-term United States Government bond, and then figure out on what terms they must meet such competition and what money will cost them.

Sees Need of Larger Utility Incomes

In speaking of local traction matters, a banker called attention to the equest made by Receiver Garrison, of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, to the courts for permission to issue \$16,000,000 Receiver's Certificates to pull the Brooklyn Rapid Transit out of its present difficulties and place the corporation on a sound financial and operating basis. This banker believes that in general public utilities all over the country, and especially the railways, must find some way of increasing their incomes to meet additional expenses or face receiverships in the near future. He gave as an instance the Pittsburgh Railways, for whose former management nothing extenuating could be said, but which, on account of strong popular opinion, could not increase its fares and was finally forced into a receivership, with the result that the receiver soon found that fares would have to be raised to seven cents from five cents, and even that increase he found insufficient. There are marly traction companies, he said, facing similar conditions, and, on account of the conditions, new financing is practically impossible.

In connection with the Brooklyn Rapid Transit financing it is claimed that before the appointment of a receiver the former managenent had completed sufficient new construction work as to be permitted to capitalize \$20,000,000 worth, and they claim there would have been no occasion for a receiver if they had been able to place these securities.

Inventories of supplies show that the government has 3000 tons re-enforcing steel; 14,516,000 brick; 350,000,000 feet of lumber; 115,523 barrels of cement; 77,560 barrels of lime; 159,522 kegs of nails; 1,122,313 square feet of metal lath and other building material.
