Orange Salad... Remove the peel from four oranges and then separate the carapels and cut with a sharp scissors into pieces. Place in a bowl and add one cupful of coconut...

Orange Dressing... Juice of two oranges. Grated rind of one-half an orange. One-half cupful of water. One-half cupful of sugar. Two tablespoonfuls of cornstarch...

Orange Souffle... Juice of three oranges. One-half cupful of water. One-half cupful of sugar. Five level tablespoonfuls of evaporated milk. Dissolve the starch and sugar in the water...

Orange Cream Pie... Line a pie tin with plain pastry and then place in a saucepan one cupful of milk. One-half cupful of water. Juice of three oranges. Grated rind of one-half orange. Six level tablespoonfuls of cornstarch...

Orange Sirup... Grate very lightly the rind from one dozen oranges and then squeeze out all the juice, and then place three pounds of sugar and the grated rind and the juice in a clean aluminum saucepan. Place where it will heat very slowly and then the sugar will melt...

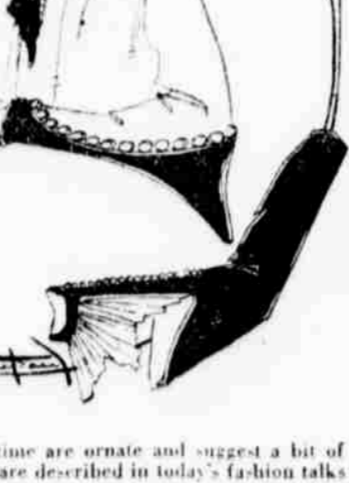
