

PICHON TALKS OF RUSSIA FAILURE

France Not Displeas With Result of British-American Plan

SMALL HOPE OF MEETING Next Step in Situation, if All Factions Refuse, Not Considered

Paris, Jan. 28.—(By S. P.)—The French Foreign Minister, who followed the example of the American, British and Italian delegates to the Peace Conference in giving a group interview to the press representatives of the world, improved somewhat on the methods of others who have had to say about the advantage of publicity and their sharp, most from M. Pichon not only said one or two things that were significant and interesting, but gave the correspondents the biggest surprise of their Peace Conference experience as far as desiring that he could be quoted on everything he had said.

His conversation was chiefly about the failure of the Bolsheviks and other Russian factions to accept the invitation of the American and Allied governments for a meeting at Prince Islands. Furthermore, M. Pichon admitted that the Bolsheviks had the right to be considered as one of several governments not existing in Russia. He seemed to have little expectation of a conference with the Bolsheviks at any time, and it was not difficult to imagine that he was rather pleased that otherwise in view of the fact that he had previously rejected the Lord George proposal for such a conference, and that subsequent to that refusal the French Government had yielded to American and Great Britain in the matter of the Prince Islands.

As to whether the Allies would entertain a suggestion from the Bolsheviks for a meeting at some place more accessible than Prince Islands, M. Pichon said the question had not arisen. He also declared that the Allies had the right to demand that the next step in the Russian situation would be a meeting of the Russian groups, which would include the Bolsheviks.
