Private John Jerico was severely wounded and gassed when he went "over the top" for the sixteenth time. As if he had a charmed life, he fought through five battles without receiving a scratch and then on October 11, just one month to the day before the armistice was signed, Jerico fell with an attack of gas.

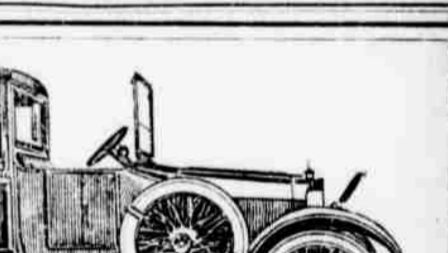
Private Jerico belongs to Company A, Sixty-first Infantry. He was drafted in November, 1917, and sent to Camp Meade for training. Jerico is twenty-three years old, and is married. His wife, Mrs. Helen Jerico and baby, live at 2001 West Oxford street. His parents are dead. He has a sister, Marie, who lives at the West Oxford street address. A brother, Joseph, was recently discharged from the service.
