

P. R. R. BUILDING \$10,000,000 YARD That at West Morrisville Will Be One of World's Largest

50 MILES MORE TRACK When Completed, it Will Handle 6000 Cars of Freight a Day

Morrisville, Pa., Jan. 26.—Some \$10,000,000 is being expended by the Pennsylvania Railroad company at West Morrisville for the improvement and enlargement of the freight yard and enlargement of the freight yard and enlargement of the freight yard.

In addition to extending the railroad yard several miles beyond Fallington, nearly fifty miles of additional track will be laid. The yard at West Morrisville was started in 1891 and extensions have been added until it now covers an area of 1,000 acres.

Little more than thirty acres of land were utilized when the yard was opened here, but today the new yard takes in about 1,000 acres, which gives the company a yard five miles long and 128 feet wide, with space for fifty tracks.

The yard is divided into six smaller yards, three eastbound and three westbound. The eastbound yard contains four tracks and will accommodate 1200 cars, while the westbound yard contains four tracks and will accommodate 1000 cars.

Steam shovels have been busy here for many months and the excavated earth yards are being used in addition to extending the length and width of the improvement. The eastbound yard is being built further up the road, which not only removes a dangerous place in the Conestoga highway, but also accommodates cars and drivers of other vehicles a much better and shorter route to Philadelphia.

The round house is about complete and with many more cars being repaired in this department of the railroad every month. More than 100 of these are overhauled and placed in first-class condition every day.

The car repairing department is one of the principal branches of the service, and more than 100 cars are repaired here daily.
