Overcome with grief when the body of her brother-in-law, with whom she had been associated in business for sixty years, was taken from the house for burial, Mrs. Elizabeth Gormley suffered a stroke of apoplexy today and is expected to die...

At first Mrs. Gormley was believed to be dead, and sisters from St. Ann's Catholic parish attending the funeral recited the prayers for the dead...

Mr. Gormley's brother, the Rev. John Gormley, is a prominent Catholic priest of Boston...

Mr. Gormley was born in County Tyrone, Ireland, and came to this country when he was eighteen years old, settling in Port Richmond and going into business with his sister-in-law immediately after his arrival...

Solemn requiem mass was celebrated at St. Ann's Church for Mr. Gormley this morning and the body was laid to rest in the graveyard adjoining the church...

Six nephews of the dead man acted as pallbearers. They were James, Patrick, Edward and John Gormley, and Edward and James Conroy...

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WOULD HAVE STATE CARE FOR TEACHERS

Experts Declare Adoption of System for Present Plan Means Economy

Experts who have compiled figures on the subject declare it would be economy for the Board of Education to adopt the State pension fund system...

The cost to the Board of Education to put the present local system on a solvent basis to meet present requirements, it is figured, will be \$148,537 for the year 1915, \$208,217 for 1916, \$259,403 for 1917. The present liability assumed is \$10,014,029.

If the merger is effected, experts say, the cost to the board would be \$330,300 for 1915, \$424,182 for 1916 and \$528,877 for 1917. The present liability assumed would be \$4,995,837.

One of the best points in the whole plan of the new State law, declared Louis Nusham, associate superintendent of schools, is the fact that teachers would be retired automatically at the age of seventy.

"It makes the school system more adequate and efficient to eliminate those teachers who can no longer perform their duties as they used to. I believe that not more than two out of twenty teachers above seventy years of age are capable of holding the position. With this new pension law, the teacher does not have to resign, nor does the board have to pay anything to pay in the matter. The State law automatically retires the teacher when seventy years old and the pension begins."

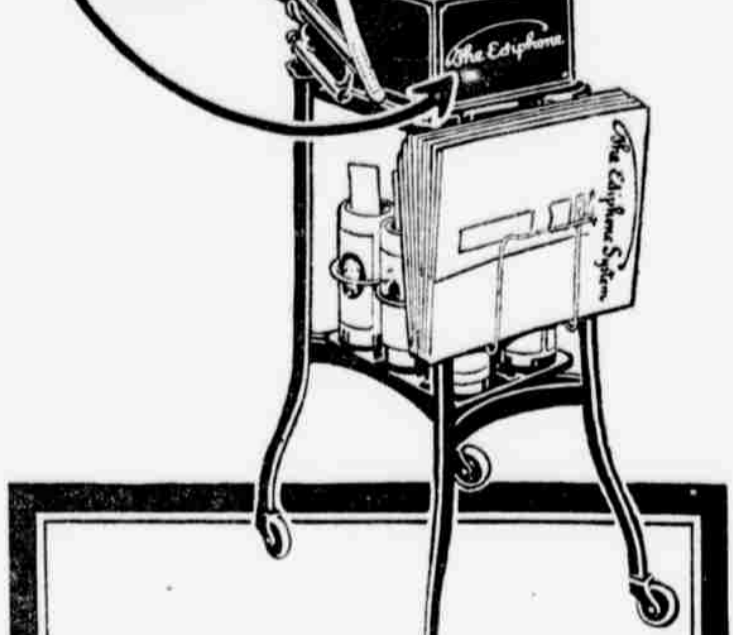
