ous positions in trees with machine guns along the route where the 116th Infantry was to advance.

His companions were killed by hidden gunners, and he was slightly wounded Young decided to play dead, and the Germans, after kicking him a few times, thought that he was done for, and left him where se fell. Hours later under the cover of darkness, Private Young found his way back to his company, found his way back to his company.

Seven other times he was sent out on similar missions, always accompanied by a number of men, and each time his comrades were killed by snipers or waylaid at cross roads, and each time Private Young came back unburf. Young came back unhurt.

Then, for the ninth time, officers of Company B sent out a detail to locate and destroy the snipers. This time Private Young stayed belind, and no one of the detail returned to tell the result

of the expedition.

Private Young in his last letter home said that after being on the "dangerous detail" for the first time he felt no fear of death from the concealed German and the heart of the feet of the concealed German and the heart of the concealed German and the man gunners, and that he rather liked
