GOSSIP OF THE STREET

PROPOSE TWO CLASSES OF BONDS IN THE COMING "VICTORY" LOAN

Local Banker Would Have One Class Appealing to Those of Large Incomes; the Other, to Persons of Small Means-Gossip of the Street

 $A^{\rm MONG}$ the many suggestions in reference to the coming Victory Loan which have appeared in this coulmn recently, one which was made by a local banker seems to have taken hold among certain financiers in New York, / It is said that when Secretary of the Treasury Carter Glass visits New York, as he is scheduled to do next Friday to attend a dinner given by the Federal Reserve Bank officials and directors, a proposition will be made to him to provide for the issuance of two classes of bonds in connection with the Victory Loan; one that will appeal to those of large incomes, say a 31% or 4 per cent bonds with a liberal exemption from faxation, and another issue of 415 or 5 per cent bonds, with a simited exemption of principal from normal but not from surtaxes, which would appeal to those of small means.

From the opinions of those interviewed on the subject the plan does not meet with general approval. One banker said that in his opinion such a plan would very much complicate the sale of the bonds; that it must be kept in mind the appeal for the sale of the bonds is made to the millions, many of whom have only recently become owners of bonds and don't yet quite understand what they have.

One Popular Issue of Bonds Believed Best

He also gave as his opinoin that it would be much better to make only one popular issue, that is, a 4% or 5 per cent bond, with liberal exemption from normal income tax, and make it convertible into the other form for this particular issue only.

Another objection to having two different classes of bonds for this issue would arise from the difficulty of knowing beforehand how much of each kind to issue. Of course, he remarked, an unlimited amount of each kind could be issued and it could be understood that the total amount of the two combined would be \$6,000,000,000, but he said such an arrangement might create more confusion than would compensate for the trouble.

Another banker called attention to the third British war loan, which was issued in February, 1917, in two parts-one a taxable 5 per cent issue and the other a tax-exempt 4 per cent issue. The tax-exempt bonds were not successful. Out of a subscription of \$5,000,000,000, only \$110,000,000 was in 4 per cent tax-exempt bonds. There is, however, he added, an important point in this connection to be taken into consideration-the 5 per cent issue, due in 1947, was offered at 95, while the 4 per cent issue was offered at par.

Illinois Central's New Issue of 51/2 Per Cent Bonds

There was very favorable comment in the financial district on Saturday over the offering by the National City Company and Kuhn, Loeb & Co. of an issue of \$16,000,000 Illinois Central Railroad fifteen-year 1% per cent bonds. They were offered at 97%, to yield 5% per cent if held to maturity or 6% per cent if taken up at the earliest redemption date. These bonds are a direct obligation of the company, and will be secured by bonds of the company or its subsidiaries with a present market value of about \$20,000,000.

These bonds were sold by the railroad company to cover expenditures additions, betterments, terminals, equipment and other facilities.

As a well-known banker said in referring to the excellence of these bonds from an investment standpoint, "The bonds of a road of the class to which the Illinois Central belongs, which has an uninterrupted record of dividend payments from 1863 to the presen' time, need no other recommendation." The dividend rate for recent years has been \$15 a year.




