Double Casualty Record Issued by the War Department

HEAVY AFTERNOON LIST

Eighty-three Reported Dead and Missing and 938 Wounded

Washington, Feb. 12 .- Army casualties for all ranks reported by the War Department today total 1868 names, 847 of which are in the morning list. Out of a total of 1921 names for the afternoon list, eighty-three are reported dead and missing and 935 wounded.

There are also thirty-four names another marine casualty list, twenty-nine of whom were reported killed in action or dead from wounds and disease.

SLAIN SERGEANT THOUGHT CAPTIVE

Family Hoped Frank Lewis, Reported Dead Now, Would Return

TWO KILLED ON LIST

Philadelphian Reported as Wounded Known to Be Among Lost

The names of forty-ine men from this ity and its suburbs appear among the 1860 given out for the country.

Two Philadelphians are reported killed in action-Sergeant Henry Lloyd. 6320 Rising Sun avenue, and Sergeant Frank Lewis, 1942 East Cambria street.

Frank Lewis, 1842 East Cambria street. Sergeant Lloyd's death was previously reported unofficially.

Sergeant Lewis was thought to have been a prisoner in Germany. The War Department reported that he had been missing in action since September 29, and later that he had been released from the German prison camp at Rastat. The boy's mother became anxious about her son and went to Washington, where she found he was recorded as having been released from the prison camp and was classed as in excellent health.

Though the soldier had not written nome since August, his parents never suspected that any harm had come to him until the War Department message tame last week saying he had been killed in action.

Errors of Clerk

Errors of Clerk

Sergeant Lewis was a member of Company B, 315 Infantry, and went into the service in the first draft in September, 1917. He trained at Camp Meade and sailed overseas last May. The War Department has explained that the conflicting reports about the fate of the soldier were errors made by a government clerk in Washington.

There are 193 Pennsylvanians among the casualties for today. About four-fifths of these are of the "minor" class. Four officers and four privates in the city's report are wounded severely. Fifteen others from this city are classified as wounded, with degree undetermined, twenty-one are wounded slightly and six who were previously reported missing have been located. No accidents for the army overseas have been reported for the last ten days. the last ten days.

SKETCHES OF THE HEROES

Private Patrick Naughton, 2298 St. Albans street, reported missing in November, is now said to be wonded. An aunt, Mrs. Clara Strain, living at the St. Albans street address, has received official notices that her nephew was wounded September 30. He is twenty-six years old and a member of Company L. 315th Infantry. A brother, Joseph Naughton was severely wounded during the war while serving with the British army. Another brother, John Naughton, is in the American army.

Private Abrame Capere.

Private Jerôme Marks, 2332 Clifford street, killed in action October 4, is erronously reported severely wounded by War Department today. Private Marks was a member of the 75th, Company 5th, Marines. The last latter received from him was written under date of September 28 from a French hospital. Comrades returned to this country verify the report that he was killed in action. Marks was twenty-two years old. He enlisted in August, 1917, and trained a year before going overseas. Previous to entering the service he had lived with his parents at the Clifford street address.


