Father's Property Configented

In the early days of the war, in 1914 the Germans murdered the relatives of the young hero's father, confiscated all his father's property, including a large sugar refinery, and destroyed his palace. The Grotthus estate was situated in Po-

land, 500 miles south of Warsaw. In his last letter home the youthful soldier said he had taken his toll of the boche, and that he was satisfied for his part, but hoped that by the peace terms the Germans would be reduced to beggary for the crimes they committed during the war.
