

COSSACKS SAVED BY YANKS

U. S. Commander Won't Surrender Them for Internment

Viadivostock, March 2.—(By A. P.)—General Kamikoff, the Cossack commander on the Ussiri River front, has sentenced to sixteen months internment the revolting Cossacks who are now under American profection at Khabarovsk. Major General William S. Graves, commander of the American forces, is firm in his determination not to surrender the men or their equipment to Kamikoff, whom he regards as irresponsible and

when he refuses to recognize in any manner.
General Graves is willing that the Cossacks join as a body any legitimate force of troops or that they disperse to their homes unarmed, whereupon he would be ready to deliver their equipment to the Japanese. The only proviso in regard to the disposition of the Cossacks is that they must act as a unit, and not as individuals, and thus avoid becoming a menace.
