

4 CITY SOLDIERS REPORTED DEAD Casualty List Today Also Contains Names of Eight Wounded DEATHS FROM DISEASE Negro Hero Receives War Department Telegram Saying He Is Dead

Four deaths from disease of men from this city with the overseas army are reported by the War Department today. In every case the soldiers died from influenza or from pneumonia that had developed from the epidemic. Eight other men from here are classified in the list as wounded.

Sergeant Major John Henry Murphy, 547 North Sixth street; Philip Simmons, 5721 Wayne avenue; private Edward William Hoot, 1910 McClellan street, and John D. Nardo, 1502 McClellan street, are the dead on the city's list. Thirty-four Pennsylvanians are on the honor roll today, sketches of the local heroes follow.

Private Nicholas Mune was gassed in October and recovered only again to get lost in the jungle in France. He is twenty-four years old and has been in the army since September, 1917. He is now in hospital at the Hog Island shipyard.

Private Charles B. Carr, 5221 Larchwood avenue, 410th Infantry, reported wounded today, fully recovered and returned to his unit. He is now in hospital at the Hog Island shipyard.

Private William Harvey, negro, 1154 Penn street, Camden, a member of Company K, 36th Infantry, passed in the fighting in the Argonne, returning to his home a few days ago. Harvey had the unusual experience of receiving a notice from the War Department yesterday that he had been killed in action.

Private James Martha, Camden, twenty-nine years old, reported missing from his company since October. He is now officially declared to have been killed in action. He was a member of company K, 37th Infantry, and had been in the service since the outbreak of the war. He was trained at Fort Sill.

Private John D. Nardo, reported dead today, escaped many dangers during the fighting in the Argonne. He was a member of the Third Aircraft Machine-Gun company, only to be killed in the Argonne. He was trained at Fort Sill.

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281 WOUNDED IN CASUALTY LIST Total Army Losses for the Day Reported at 340

Deaths Due to Disease Number 33, and 12 Victims of Accident

Washington, March 5.—Army casualties released by the War Department today total 340. Of this number 195 were published in the morning report and 145 in the afternoon record, as follows: Killed in action, 14; died from disease, 33; killed by accident, 12; wounded, 281.
