North Hills Star Now Favorite to Meet Armstrong in Final WILL PLAY OFF TIE

Pinehurst, N. C., March 6.—It was announced yesterday that the tie for the medal in the spring golf tournament here between Dwight L. Armstrong, of California, and Eddie Styles, of Philadelphia, will be played off in two 18-hole rounds on courses Nos. 2 and 3 on Friday and Saturday.

Both players won their matches without overexerting themselves in the first round, played on No. 2 course yesterday, and both finished around 80. Armstrong eliminated W. H. Fuller of Worcester, Mass., by a 2-1 score. Fuller defeated Joe Bydolek, of Buffalo, by a 2-1 score.

HARVARD STUDENTS PROTEST

Crimson Undergraduates Opposed to Present Plans of "Big Three"

Cambridge, Mass., March 6.—The Harvard student council, representing the undergraduate body at Harvard University, adopted a resolution last night favoring a revival of peace-time football and expressing opposition to any code of rules between Harvard, Yale and Princeton which might bring criticism from other colleges. The resolution said: "Whereas, any code of rules between Harvard, Yale and Princeton would tend to give an erroneous impression of the existence of an exclusive triumvirate and is contrary to undergraduate opinion, it is believed extremely unwise to enter into any additional limiting agreement except such eligibility rules as may from time to time appear necessary."
