President and General Pershing Will Donate Cups for Allied Meet

BEGIN STADIUM WORK

Paris, March 11—President Wilson and General John J. Pershing have ween offered trophies for the inter-Allied Olympic meet, which is to be held at Joinvilly-le-Pont, near Paris in June. This announcement has proved a great incentive for competition, and the interest in the athletic games has increased. The President's trophy will go to the nation scoring the greatest number of points in the track and field events, while General Pershing's trophy will be awarded to the winning team in the rifle shooting competition. rifle shooting competition.

Colonel Walt C. Johnson, chairman of the games committee, has announced that General Pershing has given his hearty consent to the naming of the great athletic stadium and field now being constructed on the French military ground at Johnville-le-Pont, "Pershing Field." The field, after the games, will be turned over to the French to will be turned over to the French to stand for years as a monument to the strong ties of friendship between the two

Construction work has been started at Construction work has been started in Joinville, and in the coming weeks the project will be pushed to completion. At an appropriate time, a dedicatory cere-mony will be held, when General Per-shing and the other officers of the Amer-

ican expeditionary force will be invited to be present.

The event has aroused so much inturest among the members of the Amer-ican forces that numerous athletes who could now have been on their way home bave asked to be allowed to remain until the big games are over. In nearly all cases these requests have been granted, as the American forces are more than anxious to win the Allied games.
