Corporal Frank Fack, 108 1/2 E. 12th, severely gassed at Chateau Thierry, has returned to this country. He wears three wound chevrons, and has recovered and been discharged from the service.

"The gas of the mustard variety was our worst enemy on the Argonne front," said the veteran, "and was responsible for the greater part of our casualties." He was attached to the 19th Infantry, which suffered such severe losses at Chateau Thierry and in the Argonne woods.

There was total blindness for more than six weeks after being gassed, but he recovered and rejoined his regiment before the armistice. He enlisted at the age of eighteen, when volunteers were called for to suppress the Mexican rebellion. His home is at 3224 Addison street.

Three Dead on List
Included in a total of seven on the honor roll for the city are three dead.

Washington, March 11.—One hundred and three are reported dead in four army casualty lists, containing a total of 274 names, all ranks, released by the War Department today.

Of the day's total, 115 were in the morning report and 129 are in the afternoon report, as follows: Killed in action, six; died from wounds, five; died of disease, thirty-six; wounded, eighty-two.
