

CAMP TOO BUSY FOR A. A. U. WORK

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Yale Athletic Authority Declines to Run for Amateur Sports President

PLANS MASS ATHLETICS
New Haven, March 12.
WALTER CAMP, head of the athletic division of the navy commission on training camp activities and for thirty years athletic adviser of Yale, today issued a statement, declining to allow the use of his name as a candidate for the presidency of the A. A. U.

His statement asserts that industrial athletics, recreational sport to the masses, is the great problem of the future, and that he proposes to regard it as his life work. His statement is as follows: "I regard it as a very great honor to have been considered as head of the A. A. U., a body which has made such a record for the advancement of athletic sports. But, unfortunately, it would be impossible for me to consider the acceptance of the position because I could not give the time that it would require."

"I was obliged for similar reasons to decline the invitation from the new National Boxing Board, an organization which has grown out of the war and which should be of great aid to that branch of sports. "Every boy and man, every girl and woman has a heritage of health in play, and I believe that the greatest gift of our endeavor will be that of industrial athletics, and in this I feel our most powerful organizations should become factors. "If one considers Americanization in this country, he finds that the clearest democracy is that of the athletic field, whether in school, college or club."

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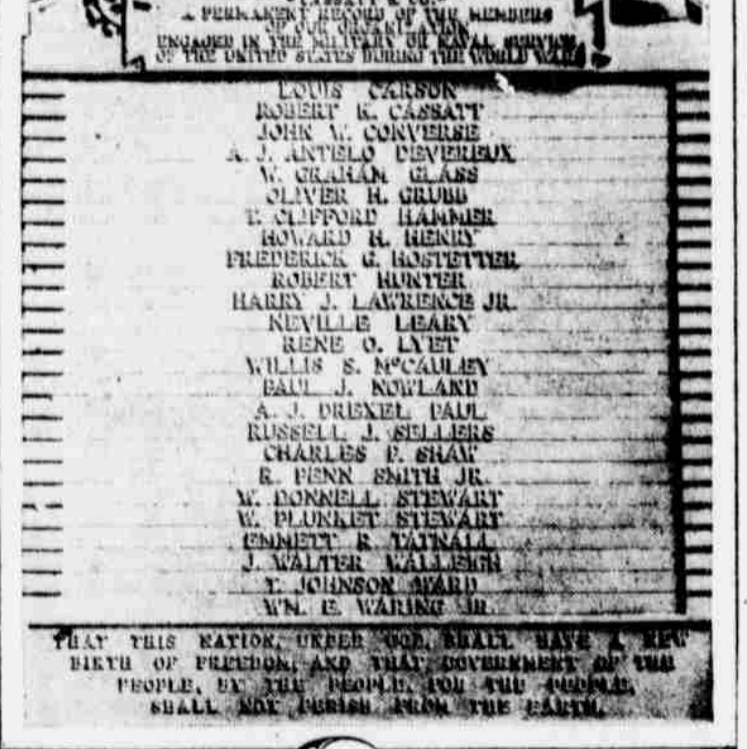
