

GOSSIP OF THE STREET LOCAL BANKER, HOME FROM WEST, PREDICTS BIG BOOM IN BUSINESS

Industrial Plants Changing From War to Peace Basis. Foresees Prosperity That Will Carry All Before It—Gossip of the Street

J. C. MORTON, of Townsend, Whelen & Co., has just returned from a two weeks' trip to Chicago. During that time he came into most intimate relations with leading bankers, railroad men and men in the packing and other large interests of Chicago.

These men, he said, see nothing but a big business boom ahead, and no one could convince them of any other possible outcome. They seem to be big orders ahead in every industry, with a prosperity that will carry all before it.

One thing he noticed particularly was how quickly the industrial plants out West are changing from war to peace industry. Many of them have completely adapted themselves to the new conditions and some are in the transition state.

Asking the big railroad officials from whom he had the opportunity to find their opinions on the railroad situation had to pay on the subject, Mr. Morton said that every man of them was noncommittal and fought shy of giving any opinions on any phase of the subject.

A dispatch from Washington says it has been decided to issue federal warrants to reimburse the railroads to the extent of more than \$700,000,000 until Congress comes to their relief.

People are talking very generally about the labor question in this country, said a banker, as if something dreadful was likely to develop from the labor situation.

As a matter of fact, he said, he believed, long before the summer is over, such conditions will be so completely reversed that the scarcest commodity in the country will be labor.

They are going to almost every country, he said, to take up property in many cases formerly belonging to relatives who have been wiped out by the war.

It was remarked in the financial district yesterday how the announcement on Monday of the United States Steel Corporation's uncompleted orders for February, although they were less by 673,481 tons than on January 21, failed to create a ripple on the stock market.

A broker who deals largely in steel said that, from the published figures, it would seem that deliveries have been received by the corporation equal to 85 per cent of its deliveries.

The outlook, however, he said, is strongly in favor of a reduction in prices at the conference of the steel men in Washington yesterday, followed by an influx of orders which will send unfilled tonnage away up again.

GLASS TOLD PLAN TO FINANCE MEN

Railroad Administration and War Finance Men Propose Warrants

EXPLAIN TO SECRETARY He Considers U. S. Certificates of Indebtedness Available as Collateral

By the Associated Press Washington, March 12.—Proposals for financing the railroads of this country pending appropriation by Congress of the necessary funds were laid before Secretary Glass, of the Treasury, today by railroad administrators and war finance corporation officials.

The plan, which was developed yesterday at a conference of railroad executives and representatives of the railroad administration and war finance corporation, provide for issuance of government warrants to railroads for the amounts due on bonds of the railroads.

The warrants would amount virtually to certificates of indebtedness, to be cashed when Congress appropriates the amount requested by the railroad administration. The railroad companies would be permitted to use the warrants as collateral for loans.

A special committee of railroad executives, headed by Howard H. Hunt, president of the Northern Pacific, was appointed to negotiate and distribute the loans, which would be arranged by each individual railroad company.

The proposed plan, or whatever plan may be finally adopted, would be carried out largely through Swagar Shierley, of Louisville, who retired as a member of the House of Representatives at the close of the last Congress.

Mr. Shierley will succeed John Skelton Williams, retired, as chairman of the railroad administration's division of financial affairs, and will be in office from April 15.

FRESH HIGH RECORDS IN CORN PIT

Dealings Heaviest for Some Time—Break Follows Rise. Oats Have Setback

Chicago, March 12.—Fresh high records for the movement were made in the corn market here today and dealings were the heaviest in a long time. The start was stronger, and almost every commission house then had orders to buy on a jump of 20 points in price.

There was a continued light movement of corn, but it was not unaccompanied, however, and a break followed. Shortly after midday buying by a big local bull leader forced a resumption of the movement upward and caught some of the pit trade short.

PROFIT OF BIG SUGAR COMPANY DECREASES

Report of American Refinery Shows Only 3/4 Cents on Each Dollar of Sales

New York, March 12.—The annual report of the American Sugar Refining Company for the year ending December 31, 1918, made public today, shows profit on operation of \$6,681,832.66 after providing for income and other taxes, or \$2,302,687.55 less than 1917 operating profit. The total business of the company amounted to more than \$200,000,000 which was about the same as last year.

The profit was about 3 3/4 cents on each dollar of sales. The report was given out today at the annual stockholders' meeting at Jersey City by Earl D. Babst, who is just completing his third full fiscal year as the company's president. Cash on hand at December 31 was \$4,252,312.50 for a large cash surplus.

The report is due to the high price of raw sugar and of other supplies and materials necessary for the refining operation, which makes the situation of capital resources during extended periods of the year, not accurately reflected in a balance sheet coming at the end of the year when operations are at low ebb and when conditions are at their best.

The company's advertising expense has been increased \$500,000, bringing that item up to \$2,500,000. It was the largest item in the report.

Stockholders increased from 19,758 to 20,877, one-half of whom are women. The average stockholding had decreased from four to three shares in 1918 and 1917 and forty-five and a half in 1912 to forty-three in 1918.

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LIVERPOOL PURCHASES OLD CONTRACT COTTON

Wall Street Buys New Crop. Spot Houses the Chief Sellers

New York, March 12.—Liverpool buying of old style contracts for liquidation purposes and Wall Street buying of new crops furnished the chief feature at the opening of the cotton market today. Old style contracts, at the start, ranged from 53 points higher to 14 points lower, while new styles were 1 to 2 points higher. Spot houses were the chief sellers of the new contracts.

There was a good deal of trade here, with the best style, the market being 4 1/2 to 4 7/8 points above last night's closing figures, with May touching 23.45c, compared with 21.75c, the low price of last Friday.

Old style contracts were equally firm, selling at 63 to 65 points above last night's closing figures.

Probably the increase in the low-grade discounts helped the old style market, which has shown a tendency to work more in sympathy with middling cotton since the early March notices were absorbed.

The buying movement was encouraged by the strength of the stock market and the better tone in goods, but possibly by the prospects for an early conclusion of peace and a lifting of the embargo on shipments to central Europe.

The receipts at the ports for the day are estimated at 16,000 bales, against 16,428 bales a week ago; 17,663 bales a year ago, and 11,710 bales two years ago.
