

BLUE LAW BILL REPORT TUESDAY

Legislative Committee to Tell Recommendation After Adjournment

PUBLIC HEARINGS CLOSE Theatrical Magnate Points to Sunday Movies for Soldiers in France

Recommendations of the subcommittee of the Judiciary Special Committee of the Legislature on the Blue Law bill to amend the Sunday "blue laws" will be announced after adjournment of the House next Tuesday, according to Representative W. F. Horke, author of the bill.

There is much speculation today as to what the recommendations will be. The hearings closed yesterday at Harrisburg after a busy morning session in which both the opponents and those who favor the bill put forth their arguments and suggestions.

The "stellar attraction" of the hearing was William A. Brady, the theatrical magnate, who was the last speaker to favor the bill. He expressed the thought that the great army of soldiers of peace, the working men and women of America, in contrast to the military units of the expeditionary forces that saved the day in the great war, must be considered.

Mr. Brady, who was applauded by President Wilson to lead the educational campaign in moving pictures in France and other countries during the war, and propaganda, reminded the crowd that the Assembly chamber that the Y. M. C. A. gave to the soldiers in the soldiers in France on Sunday evenings.

Says Workmen Entitled to Consideration "You should take up as good cause for the workmen in peace as you did of the soldiers during the war," he declared amid cheers.

Mr. Brady, in speaking of a change in one of the sections proposed in the bill, who had said that there was a "million-dollar" value in the bill, and that Sunday movies and other amusements along these lines, encourage those that the article appeared on Sunday, leaving upon the soldiers in France of New York.

"The Lord's commandment is to remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy," he explained, "then has come with it the amendment, 'Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor.'"

Holding up the subject of the bill, the audience, Mr. Brady stated that the platform and the stage of the religious of ministers in front of him.

"I have the greatest respect for all you men and women who are here in opposition to the bill," said Mr. Brady. "But I cannot believe that the great American people are in sympathy with you in your position."

Judge Bonnell's Sharp Retort A separation of the hearing was the sharp retort of the Municipal Court Judge Eugene C. Bonnell made to a statement by the Rev. P. V. Sweeney, field secretary of a Protestant church, that Archbishop Maguire of Philadelphia, Bishop McElroy of Harrisburg, and other dignitaries of the Catholic Church had told him they were strongly opposed to a repeal of the Sunday laws.

Judge Bonnell retorted: "The Roman Catholic hierarchy is not given to making announcements of this nature. Archbishop Maguire would certainly not do so through an official of another religious denomination."

Opinion was unanimous today that the Philadelphia orchestra, under the guidance of Dr. Leopold Stokowski, was a forceful argument in favor of the passage of the bill. It was heard by "It was wonderful," and the expressions were heard today from those who attended.

One clergyman was overheard to say, as he looked the way of another: "Brother, if you and I had such an orchestra at our Sunday evening services, we would always fill the house."

The debate opened with addresses in favor of the bill, the opponents including, besides Brady and Judge Bonnell, Dr. Charles D. Hart, the Rev. Dr. John M. Moeckel, rector of St. James' Episcopal Church, and Edward Bok, all of Philadelphia; N. T. Altied, of Washington, D. C., representing the International Association of Machinists; and W. Stephen Burd, of New York, who described himself as a student of social and economic effects of moving pictures.

The opponents of the bill included, besides the Rev. Mr. Sweeney, the Rev. J. B. Markward of Harrisburg; Arthur E. Brown, headmaster of the Harrisburg Academy; the Rev. A. B. Steek, of Carlisle; Dr. J. A. Orr, of Pittsburgh; the Rev. C. L. McKee, of Washington; the Rev. W. P. Palmeth, of New Kensington; the Rev. W. C. Hogg, of Williamsport; John A. McSparran, master of the State League; and the Revs. T. T. Mitchell and W. B. Forney, of the Lord's Day Alliance.

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RESIGNATION OF REED DEMANDED

Senator's Fling at President Arouses Missouri Democrats

"AN INSULT TO PARTY" Opposition to League of Nations in Speech Before Legislature Creates Storm

By the Associated Press Jefferson City, Mo., March 20.—James A. Reed, United States Senator from Missouri, was called upon to resign his seat in the Senate in resolutions adopted here by a conference of fifty of the sixty-seven Democratic members of the House of Representatives.

The resolutions were adopted by the Democratic members of the House of Representatives in conference. That we do hereby denounce the distinguished Senator as not entitled to claim any title or standing as a Democrat in the Democratic party from Missouri, and suggest to him that if he is so confirmed in his opinions that he resign his position as Senator and again submit himself as a candidate for the high position which he now occupies to the entire dissatisfaction of the party.

These resolutions were then adopted: "Resolved by the Democrats of the House of Representatives in conference, That we do hereby denounce the distinguished Senator as not entitled to claim any title or standing as a Democrat in the Democratic party from Missouri, and suggest to him that if he is so confirmed in his opinions that he resign his position as Senator and again submit himself as a candidate for the high position which he now occupies to the entire dissatisfaction of the party."

It was charged that Senator Reed's address was an attempt to "belittle and belize" the leadership of the Democratic party and its accomplishments in the last six years, and was an effort on his part "to bring discussion and strife" to the ranks of the party, and that the speech was "a direct insult to the party and the people who had given him his political prestige and made it possible for him to acquire any degree of prominence as a Democrat and a statesman."

It was decided to place bronze tablets in the new Upper Darby High School building, bearing commemoration on the names of every soldier, sailor, airman and marine who died in the world war. The tablets will be placed in the new building, which is now under construction.
