

TWO CITY SOLDIERS ARE ON DEATH LIST

Both Previously Reported Missing, and Third Is Severely Wounded

On a general casualty list issued by the War Department today Private Vincent Giordano, 5316 Stiles street, is reported dead.

Joseph Giordano, father of the soldier who lives at the Stiles street address, was notified several months ago that his son was missing from his unit. No letters have been received from him since. The War Department message received by his relatives a few days ago fails to give the cause or date of Giordano's death.

Two other men from this city are in the casualty report. They are Hugh J. Follette, 4408 Chestnut street, who is wounded severely, and Private John Sarnoski, 2986 Tilton street, Sarnoski, who was previously reported missing, is now declared to have been killed.

Private George H. Restauski, 1418 South Howard street, has returned to duty after being separated from his unit for several months, it was learned today.

In addition to the general report, a list of major casualties, including deaths from disease, accident and other causes, and some killed in action, is furnished. A change of status, says the War Department in announcing the issuance of the new forms of casualty reports, may be expected from time to time, as posthumous investigations establish the fact that missing men were really killed, or as the hospital records are finally searched in pursuance of the policy of

publishing every casualty in the American expeditionary force. Names of men who were wounded long before the signing of the armistice, many of whom have arrived home safely, may be found in the lists. The names that appear in this report will be found elsewhere in the EVENING PUBLIC LEDGER today.

The general list today contains 142 names, sixteen of whom are from this state. The Pennsylvanians in the report are classified as follows: Died of disease, four; died from accident or other cause, three; wounded severely, three; wounded slightly, one; killed, previously reported missing, three; died, with cause undetermined, one, and returned to duty, two.

I SOLDATI AMERICANI VISITERANNO L'ITALIA

Mille Uomini al Giorno Saranno Inviati a Roma

Roma, 3 aprile.—Il governo americano, d'accordo col Supremo Comando delle forze americane in Francia, ha disposto che mille uomini di truppa dovranno giornalmente essere inviati in

Italia, ove rimarranno parecchie settimane per far sì che i soldati di "Uncle Sam" possano visitare Roma ed altre principali città del Regno. In questo modo tutte le truppe americane che si trovano ora in Francia potranno visitare l'Italia.

La notizia è stata ricevuta con grande soddisfazione ed i bravi soldati avranno da parte delle popolazioni entusiastiche accoglienze che dimostreranno quale ammirazione ha l'Italia per essi. Si spera che una tale disposizione servirà a maggiormente stringere i legami tra le due nazioni.

Il Dott. E. J. Dillon, corrispondente speciale del "Public Ledger" da Parigi, ha ieri inviato un telegramma dal quale si rileva che, secondo informazioni date

da fonte attendibile, la Conferenza della Pace, o per dir meglio i rappresentanti delle grandi Potenze, avrebbero discusso "per ragioni di convenienza" di accordare Plume a Spalato all'Italia.

Le "ragioni di convenienza" menzionate dal corrispondente, sono interpretate nel senso che il Presidente Wilson e Lloyd George hanno abbandonato le loro opposizioni alle aspirazioni italiane per evitare che la Delegazione italiana potesse rifiutarsi di firmare il trattato di pace, quando fosse stato approntato. Senza discutere tale interpretazione vi è ragione da credere che, qualora da parte del Presidente Wilson e di Lloyd George vi fossero state delle opposizioni circa le aspirazioni degli italiani, non è stato possibile disporre, in questi e simili casi, di una mobilitazione generale in detta regione, secondo un
