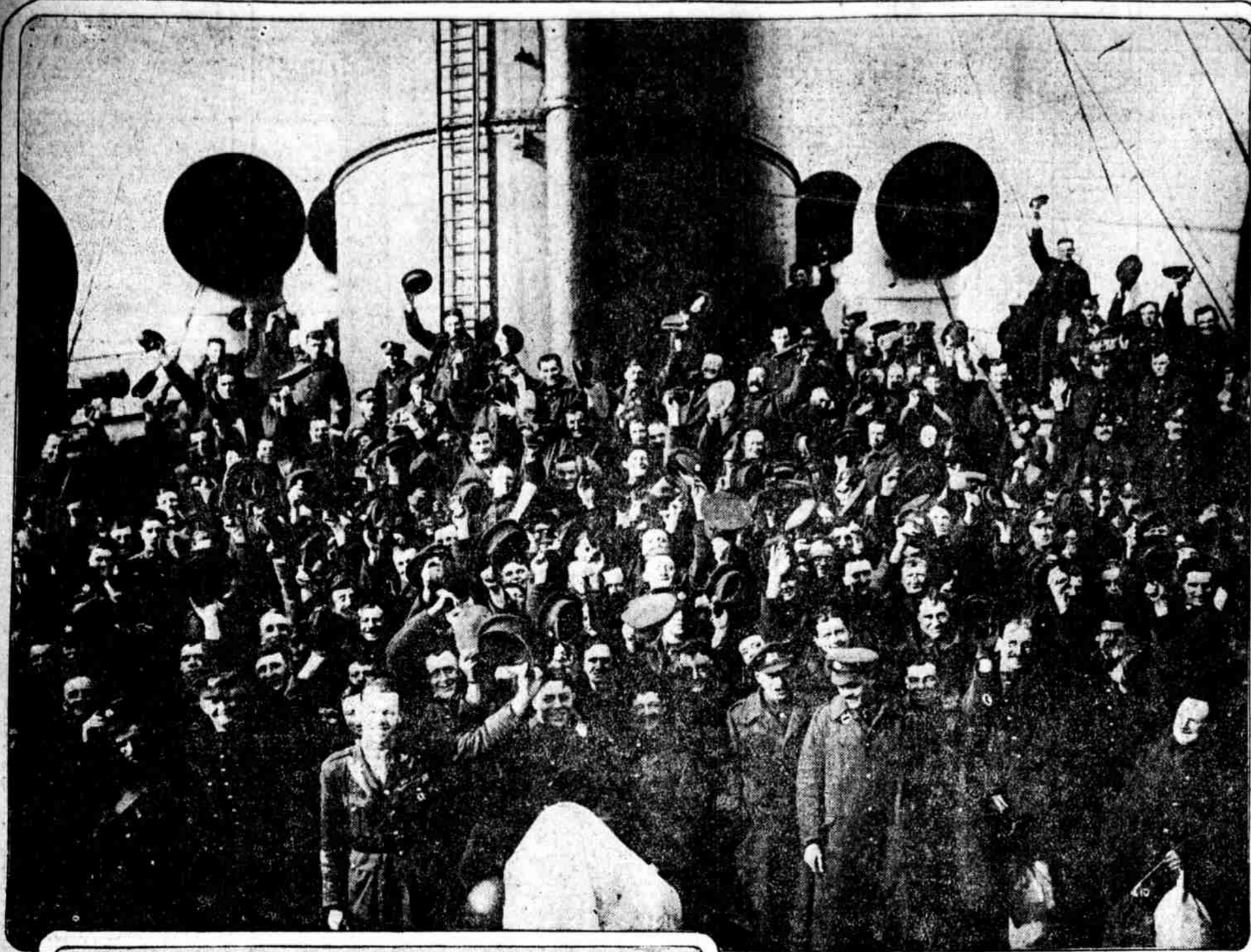
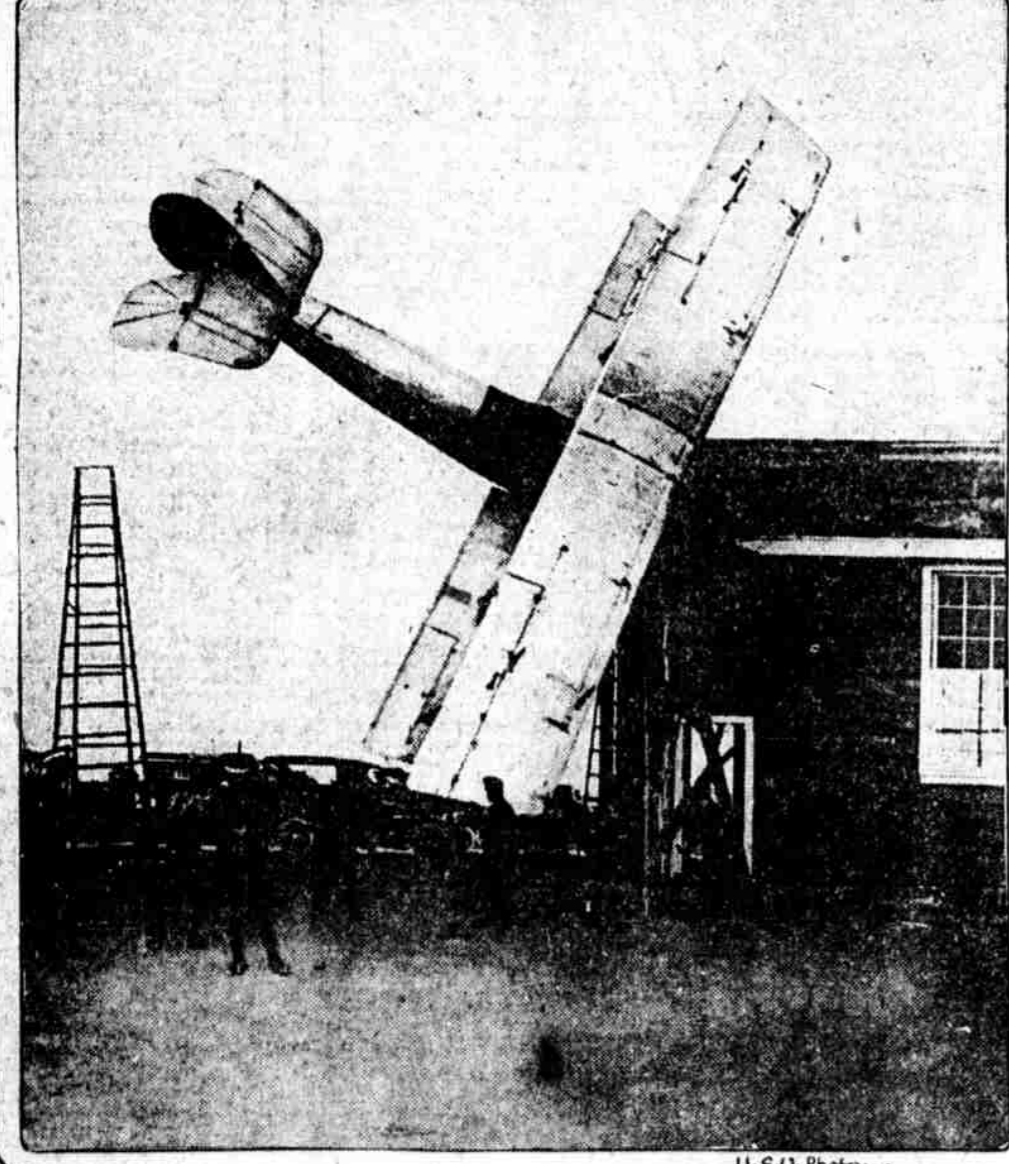


American Tommies Who Fought With British Return : Happenings Pictorially Portrayed

THE RESULT of a crash at a Texas flying field, when a student aviator lost control of his machine and it smashed into the roof of a building.



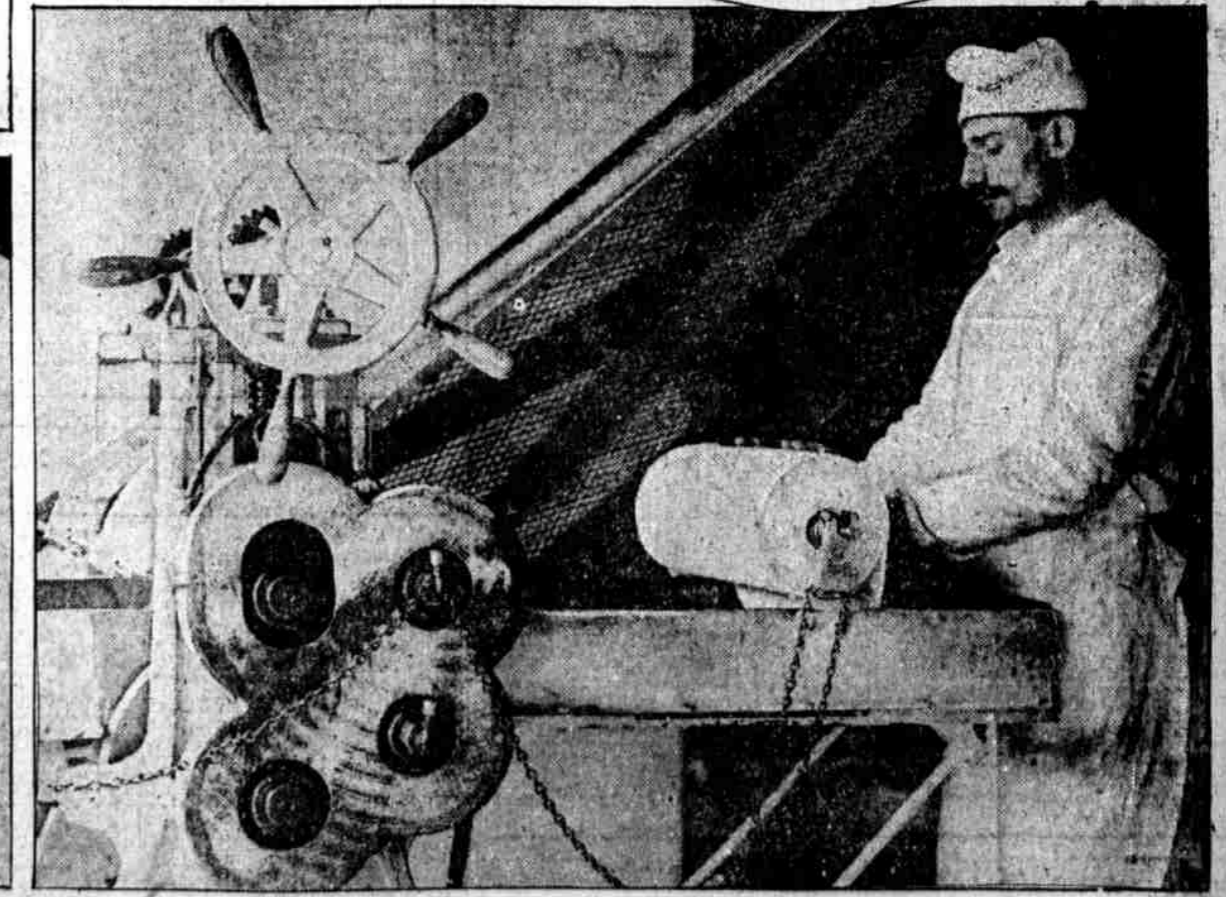

THE MATZOTH SEASON is at hand. For seven days, commencing with the Passover Supper, April 14, Jews universally eat these unleavened cakes, called matzoth, instead of bread. In the view bakers are weighing the "cakes" baked in the matzoth center in southeast Philadelphia.



MATZOTH dough is rolled into a thin layer and placed on a roller, where it begins a journey through a cutter and is baked in a long oven.

FOR MANY WEEKS previous to the Passover season bakers are busy preparing the unleavened bread for the seven-day festival.
