Banking and Brokerage Houses See Great Opportunities for This Country in All Lines of Trade-Gossip of the Street

THE following expressions from leading financial houses deal with the matters which, in their opinion, loomed largest in the financial world during last week, and the outlook for securities and general business:

Butcher, Sherrerd & Hansell-The rest of the world today needs more than ever the merchandise and other things the United States now has in so great abundance for export. Our producing capacity is at the maximum; our natural resources of cont, iron, copper and other necessities are prodigious; our man power, as compared to the tremendous losses our allies have sustained, is virtually untouched; our financial resources, greater than ever, are intelligently mobilized. Today the United States needs, perhaps, most of all, patience, good sound stuse and cotoperation.

Patience with our allies and a willingness to see their problems in a broad, generous light. Good sound sense with each other here at home. Co-operation in acquiring a fair, generous - if you please-attitude toward all workers, whether they are laboring with their heads, hands or dellars-

Edward B. Smith & Co .- Activity in trading on the stock exchange pronounced. Many stocks have experienced large advances. It is believed the approach of the Victory Loan campaign may have a quicting effect on the stock market, although no decline of consequence in prices is looked for. Money rates are likely to be higher during the coming week, and this situation will probably continue during the loan campaign.

There is a large short interest in the market and general business is gradually expanding, both factors acting toward stability of prices. We believe it advisable to take profits in highly speculative stocks, with a view of repurchasing standard stocks at reasonable concessions.

Hecker & Co .- Notwithstanding a considerable volume of profit taking, stocks held remarkably well. Peace news is more optimistic and good prog ress is now being made by the conference. This is calculated to stimulate demand for stocks, and while the condition exists the trend will be upward. When peace is consummated we must expect a wave of profit taking and the market will then have to take fresh bearings

Hughes & Dier-Those who give the subject careful consideration and make their selections with care, giving proper attention to those specialties such as companies having to do with food products, fertilizers, farming implements, tobacco products, etc., will find themselves well foundationed for results marketwise which would prove extremely satisfactory, while good securities purchased around present levels will no doubt yield much larger returns on the investment than will be found possible to obtain within a few months from the present time.

Chandler Brothers & Co .- A very distinctive feature, new in its development, is the quick substitution of one character of production to another. only without disadvaptage but rather to the advantage and material profit of the successor. Until recently, when a plant has demonstrated its failure in some line of production it has simply been deserted and its machinery segapped. The war particularly has taught other and more beneficent essons in the immediate reversal to some other form of activity. Hundreds of producers of peace necessities became war munitions manufacturers of one sort or another, and now that war demands have ceased they have quickly readjusted their plants toward other uses.

Wifeess the revolution of the Distillers Securities Corporation from a satisfier of thirst to a enterer to hunger as the United Food Producer, while Corn Products Company multiplies greatly its variety of products. Actna Explosives turns toward other output and the vast du Pont plant, instead of specializing in powder, dynamite, nitroglycerin, trinitrotoluol, now de velops collars, cuffs, whish brooms, perambulators, dyes, combs, campher, tooth-brushes, teething rings, leather specialties and celluloid articles with

All this barmonizes with the barnessing of energy in every practical form and with the ability to promptly change as times, fashions or demand

MacMeekin & Williamson-The railroad situation is still unsettled, and until the prospects for relief become more definite we doubt if there could be any material improvement in railroad shares. Technically they are entitled to some participation in the recent general advance in other stocks. Considerable investment purchases of railroad shares are taking place at any concessions in the prices, and this has a stabilizing effect.

The copper stocks display firmness, and while we do not expect to see them decline much lower, in our opinion any substantial advance under present conditions would appear to be questionable. Copper stocks, how ever, should be the first to reflect my marked improvement in reconstruc-

Bonds will doubtless remain quiet until the Victory Loan campaign is well on its way. We think Liberty Bonds and some of the railroad preferred stocks still remain the most attractive investments.

Guaranty Trust Company of New York-The feeling is general that business is steadily regaining the ground lost in the weeks immediately succeeding the signing of the armistice. There is as yet no boom, but confidence is returning. The fixation of prices in co-operation with the government gives promise of general acceptance, although difficulties have been encountered in the lumber trade, and this may tend to hold back building enterprises. Because of lack of funds the work of the United States employment service is being discontinued, but with the concurrence of the secretaries of war and labor a council of the emergency committee on employment for soldiers and sailors, under the direction of the council of national defense, is now aiding discharged veterans to obtain employment. Governors, mayors and chairmen of state councils of defense have been asked to co-operate

A. B. Leach & Co .- Gross earnings of the Virginia Power Company for February were \$73,041, against \$58,656 for February, 1918, a gain of 24.6 per cent; net earnings, \$29,350, as compared with \$21,814, an increase of 34.5 per cent. For the two months ended with February gross earnings were \$145,792, compared with \$117,491 for the corresponding period of 1918, an increase of 24.1 per cent; net earnings, \$58,712, as against \$45,653, a gain of 28.6 per cent.

Financiers Discuss Increased Railroad Wages

During the Saturday half session the principal note in all discussion in the financial district was in reference to the railroads. The question most frequently asked, to be left unanswered, was, Can the railroads stand the strain? A well-informed banker said the latest wage concession by Director General Hines brings the annual bill for wages for railroad workers up to \$3,000,000,000. One burden, he said, has been added after another, with no sign of relief except through the medium of taxation, which already, he remarked, is sufficiently burdensome. The cost of labor and material, he added, has outbalanced freight rates.

It may be, he said, that Director General Hibes sees a way out, and if so, it is to be hoped he will soon let it be known, for the information of that ignored class which seems to have little or no rights-the security

In spite of all the uncertainties of

the reconstruction period, in spite of the embargoes and restrictions, in spite of the falling price of commodities and the lack of ships, the export for February reached a total of \$587,900,000. This indicates a total for the fiscal year ending June 30 of no less than \$6,500. 000,000, which surpasses by more than two hundred millions the total for 1917. the record year theretofore.—Guaranty

all he can lay his hands on, but this is only general news. What is needed is specific and detailed information and this dealing directly with commodity climatic conditions and tastes of the people in style and color.

"To obtain this information it would seem necessary to commission some one to study with one definite object in view: What and how can we sell to pair, Latin America.

"It is true we have many agents here from the states who come to sell this or that particular line, but generally the goods are manufactured without very much consideration as to what would please the people of this country. It is true also that our government sent special agents to the countries of South study the commercial situation and gather information about certain commodities-wearing apparel. jewelry, electricity, port facilities, etc.

"While this has proven very valuable, it is more in the nature of statistics, a comparison of imports and exports by years, and is not sufficient for the prospective exporter.

"Worth-while sales cannot be expected if some effort is not made to produce effects that will please the tastes of the South American people, in fact we have heard salesmen grumble and growl most emphatically because their
