

TWO-YEAR CONTRACT AT SMALL SALARY DOESN'T APPEAL TO FOLWELL

CAVANAUGH BACK AS CASUAL OFFICER

Dartmouth Football Coach Returns to U. S. After Long Service in France

FROM PRIVATE TO MAJOR

Boston, April 18.—Major Frank W. Cavanaugh, of the 1024 Field Artillery of the Twenty-sixth Division, former coach of Dartmouth College football eleven, returned to America today as a casual officer on board the *Patrician*. Major Cavanaugh's face bore the marks of battle, for he was severely wounded when a German shell exploded against the door of his dugout at Sarigneux, in the Argonne, October 23, 1917. He was standing outside the

"The backwash of the shell ripped my face open," he said.

A scar under his right eye and three other wound marks on the right side of his face remain. "Cas," as he is known by football enthusiasts, declared that American army surgeons saved his right eye and patched his face up better than he had thought possible. Major Cavanaugh enlisted as a private in April, 1917. He was promoted to lieutenant, captain and major. One promotion was awarded him after he had ordered a battery under his command to put down a barrage which saved an infantry company from being attacked by greatly superior numbers of enemy troops.

He said he had no plans for the future and could think of nothing but getting to his home in Worcester, where he left his wife and children to go overseas. He said he was not under contract to coach any college football eleven this year.

NAVY CREW CONFIDENT

In Fine Shape for Race With Princeton and Harvard

Annapolis, Md., April 18.—The Princeton rowing crew arrived last evening. Harvard is here today. Both crews will practice today for the regatta with the Navy crew Saturday.

Contract Offered, but Folwell Doesn't Sign

Penn Football Committee Said to Have Tendered Two-Year Papers at Small Salary—Bob Wants Few Days to "Think It Over"

BOB FOLWELL is anxious to coach the Pennsylvania football team next fall and yesterday he was offered a contract by the Red and Blue athletic authorities. Did he spill ink all over the papers in his hurry to get his signature on the documents? He did NOT!

George Harrison Frazier, the chairman of the football committee; John Minda, graduate member of the committee; Major Pickering, the graduate manager, and Folwell, held a long conference yesterday afternoon and it was believed that the session would result in Folwell signing. Did it? It did NOT!

Short-Term Contract

The undergraduates at the University, through the medium of an editorial in the *Pennsylvanian*, requested that the athletic officials offer a long-term contract to Folwell. By long term was meant not less than three years. Did they? They did NOT!

Instead of the expected announcement that Folwell had signed, it was stated that "Mr. Folwell would make his decision in a few days." Penn students point out that there is only one reason why Folwell did not affix his signature to the contract when it was tendered him. The reason is salary.

Folwell was reached over the telephone and said that he would make no announcement at this time, but wanted a few days to think it over. He would make no direct statement in regard to the salary stipulated in the contract, but in view of the fact that he was anxious to return to Franklin Field, his words are in the form of an intimation that the figures are low.

No Hold-up

In discussing Folwell's reserved decision one ardent student supporter of the Mullica Hill farmer expressed himself as follows:

"I am quite sure Bob is not holding them up for a high salary. His contracts in the past have been small in comparison to the figures offered at other colleges, and last season he consented to take hold at an exceptionally low salary. I realize, too, that the falling off in receipts during the war

has almost drained the treasury, but the athletic association isn't so poor that it can't afford to pay Bob what he wants. His highest price would be less than half of what he's worth."

The length of the contract was not announced, but it is said that it was for two years.

3 CORNELL BLADES IN AMERICAN CREW

Yale Has Two Athletes in Eight to Row in Races on Seine

Paris, April 18.—The roster of the American crew which will take part in the international regatta on the Seine April 27 reads like an all-American selection, and college yells, more familiar to Poughkeepsie than to Paris, will startle the natives on racing day.
