## THEATRE BILLS FOR NEXT WEEK

Schedule of Entertainments at the Various Playhouses in This City

NEW ATTRACTIONS FORREST-Mask and Wig's annual show, the "Revue of Revues," a Ziegfelding of past successes, plus many novelties. 


